MONTREAL, Aug. 31.—An Indian named
Terchonkow, belonging to the Caughnawaga
tribe and living at Laprairie, was sued by
a Mr. Cherrier and his goods seized upon a
promissory note for goods purchased. Mr.
Cherrier took the case into the Commissioner's
Court at Laprairie and obtained a judgment.
A writ of prohibition was then taken out to
prevent the execution of the judgment under
the Indian act, which provides that the goods
of Indians are not subject to seizure in cases
of ordinary debt. The case has been appealed.
