ISJACK THE RIPPER CAUGHT?

HAVE THE FIEND IN CUSTODY.

He had no mercy on the wretches who were arrested on suspicion, and more than one of the miserable sect of thugs is said to have penished under the rigorous treatment intended to extort a confession of guilt.
