There are 80 permanent structures and 300 temporary ones at the Can-adian National Exhibition.

There is parking space at the Can-adian National Exhibition for 10,000 autos. On one day last year \$2,400 United States markers were counted

on the grounds.

Miniature electric cars will again be operated at the Canadian National Exhibition to transport the crowds over miles of paved streets.



There will be 4,000 musicians entertaining the crowds at the Canadian National Exhibition on Music Day, Thursday, September 3rd.

The Exhibition Chorus of 1,500 voices, under Dr. Frichker of Mendelsshon fame, will give four concerts at the coming C.N.E.

DOG DITCHES CAR ON PLYMPTON DETOUR

Wiseman, of Wyandotte, Killed; Others Injured, When Car Turns Over

was killed and two others injured in an automobile ac-cident at 8 a.m., Saturday on the London road detour, when a large American touring car went into the ditch after running over and killing a dog.

Wiseman of Wyandotte, James Mich., died instantly from a broken neck. His wife is in the Sarnia General hospital with serious injuries to her back. Larry Wilson of Wyandotte driver of the car, had his shoulder broken. Mrs. S. Finchan of Mimico, and her two children and Miss Margaret Churchur of Detroit, the remaining passengers in the car, escap-

The car was proceeding to Toronto and Mimico, when a half-mile east of the Camlachie sideroad, a dog ran across the path, and as the wheel passed over the animal the car went out of control and turned on its side in a two-foot ditch. Mr. Wiseman was thrown out into the road and died almost instantly. His wife was thrown out of the other side of the car and rendered unconscious. The dog, which was the cause of the accident was killed

Mrs. Wiseman had recovered sufficiently to leave the Sarnia Hospital and proceed to Toronto on Monday.
