The business is being very distinctly overdone now, and not all the numbers of the list will prove alike with Rockefeller, Morgan and Vanderbilt. The capitalist is fancying for his particular advantage every avenue of trade, and toleration of his selfishness has long ago ceased to be a popular virtue. Some day men with as clear a sight as any of the great captains of industry will find their way into the legislature and in a spirit of unselfishness work out a trust problem from a standpoint of national interest. The nation can resolve itself into a business community capitalized and qualified to work the wisdom of any concern that is trampling on public privileges or oppressing the people. There are a few men who are working this end and their hands will be strengthened when the people understand their aims and the virtues of the results attendant upon their accomplishment.

—The United States professes to be highly indignant at the proposal of the British government to tax importations of grain and flour, and the talk of retaliation is too general to pass unnoticed. Why is it that such a feeling should exist under the peculiar conditions of trade through which the United States has hitherto led all the advantage, and beyond common understanding, unless it is attributed to absolute selfishness. British free trade industries have enriched American industries to a degree that has placed the foreign freedom on a par with domestic restrictions, and it is not industrial activity. There has been such a palpable inequality of trading conditions, that, were it not for the fact that the British working classes have been benefited by the heavy imports from the United States, the trading would seem to resemble a robbery rather than an international bargaining. Because such conditions have existed, some of the nations have sought to remedy the situation by their own means. A British import tax on grain and flour will still leave the preponderance of trading advantage with the United States, though it will decrease the measure considerably. There is a possibility attended by a growing hope in the colonies, that the flour and grain tax may eventually result in a discriminatory duty in favor of colonial growers over foreign grain growing countries, and in that event the United States would be placed at a greater disadvantage in this trade than under the present proposition which implies a general tax. There is a prospect that present month will develop sweeping changes in the inter-imperial relations and the feeling is growing that trade concessions to the colonies are very likely to result from the breaking down of Colonialism that is trembling under Lord Salisbury's protective war tax.

—British credit has been apparently not at all impaired by the very extraordinary expense entailed by the Boer war. Deficits of millions do not shake the Englishman's nerve, so buoyant and abiding is his faith in his country and its government. In the face of the present condition of the exchange and the expensive outlook, the fact that the war was loan was over-subscribed forty times is perhaps the most substantial indication of the soundness of national credit that the world has ever known. There is no evidence of tottering or decline, in the story, but he who runs may read that the culmination of the national crises lies yet a long way off, and the stability of the new force at work in fashioning a Greater Britain are readily recognizable.
