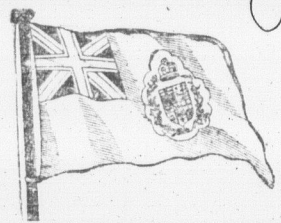

NOMINATION DAY

Every Seat but One in Nova Scotia Will be Contested.

Nominations for Nova Scotia Monday for the Dominion General Election produced few surprises. There are contests in every constituency in the Province excepting Shelburne and Queens, where Hon. W. S. Fielding has been elected by acclamation. The net result is that 32 candidates are contesting 15 seats.

Returning Officer, Harry Ruggles, Esq., opened court in the Court House in Annapolis at 12 o'clock Monday noon and at 2 p. m. declared A. L. Davidson, Barrister, of Middleton, and Dr. L. J. Lovett, physician, of Bear River, regularly nominated. The candidates addressed a large audience in the Bijou Theatre during the afternoon, at which Mr. W. J. Clarke, of Bear River, the popular warden of this county, presided.

A Bridgewater exchange says: Large quantities of apples are being shipped from there to the cider factories. The price paid is in the neighborhood of \$1.50 a barrel for windfalls or non-marketable apples.

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MARINE NEWS

Schr. Jessie Ashley, Capt. Randall, is in Boston discharging lumber from Parrsboro.

Schr. Mayflower is due at Digby with hard coal from New York for W. E. Vanharen.

J. E. Snow shipped 100 drums dry hake, 30 drums dry haddock, 44 boxes spruced cod from Digby last week.

Schr. Scotia Queen, Capt. Tupper, was towed down the river from Bridgetown Friday and sailed for Eatonville to load lumber for Boston.

Word has been received of the safe arrival at Havana of the schooner Beechland on Oct. 24th, after a maiden voyage of 26 days from Annapolis.

The Boston schr. Morning Star, Capt. Harry Ross, arrived in Boston on Monday, with a fare of 40,000 lbs. fresh fish. She sailed for the grounds again on Tuesday.

Steamer North Land is a clipper for speed. She arrived in Boston from Yarmouth at 9:30, Boston time, Thursday morning, making the run from what to what in 15 hours.

At Morehead River the Clare Shipbuilding Co. has commenced work in their yard on another schooner of the same model as the Racewell, which was launched a week or so ago.

The recently formed Saultville Shipbuilding Co. have also commenced work in their yard at Saultville and besides their yard men have a large gang in the woods after timber.

Maritime Fish Corporation arrivals at Digby: Per schr. Dorothy P. Sarty, 62,612 lbs. haddock, 5,530 lbs. cod, 450 lbs. hake, 3,169 lbs. cusk, 554 lbs. halibut; other sources, 4,649 lbs. haddock, 450 lbs. dry hake.

The Spectator says: It has been decided that the new schooner now being completed at the Annapolis shipyard will be named the Hilda M. Stark, after a young lady in Montreal. She is expected to be launched in January.

The Digby schrs. Lila Boutiller, with 24,000 lbs. of fish and the Loren B. Snow, with 6,000 lbs., arrived in Yarmouth on Wednesday and sold their fares. The former was purchased by the Gateway Co., and the latter by the Yarmouth Fish Co.

Yarmouth Telegram: The new steamer Keith Cann is hauled out on the marine slip this week. Her propeller is being put on, the foundation bolts for her engines and boilers are being put in and other necessary work below the water is being done.

The new schr. Kathleen Crowe, built at Hillsburn for Willard Smith, St. John, was launched last week. She was towed to St. John Monday by a St. John tug, assisted by the steamer Bear River. She is about 400 tons, will be rigged with three masts and is a credit to the Longmire yard at Hillsburn.

Gloucester Daily Times: The season's total mackerel catch is 143,699 barrels of which 32,162 bbls. were of salt and 111,537 barrels fresh. In 1916 the catch was 124,236 barrels of which 42,066 barrels were salt, and 102,230 barrels fresh. The salt catch for the two seasons it will be seen to be about the same.

Building operations at the Yarmouth Shipbuilding Co.'s yard promises to be very bright for some time to come. The Company has now under consideration, the putting down of a keel for a schooner of about 400 tons as soon as the craft now on the stocks is launched. A large quantity of heavy timber for such a vessel is now on hand.

Arrivals at Digby since last report: Schr. D. P. Sarty, Capt. Longmire, Nov. 14th, with 73,000 lbs. mixed fish for Maritime Fish Corporation Ltd. Sailed for fishing grounds Nov. 17th; schr. Cora Gertie, Capt. Crocker, Nov. 15th, with 30,000 lbs. haddock for Maritime Fish Corporation Ltd.; Nov. 16th, Aux. Alice Longmire, Capt. Clayton, with 200 qts. dry fish for Maritime Fish Corporation Ltd.; received by Maritime Fish Corporation, Ltd., from boats, 25,000 lbs. fresh fish.

The New York concern, under the management of Mr. Morecroft, which has recently took a seven-year lease of the extensive shipyard controlled by the late James Cosman, has also commenced building operations on a schr. of 350 tons. This company recently purchased the Blackadar mills at Morehead Station, and have removed to their Morehead River premises, where they have equipped them with a large amount of the most up-to-date machinery for shipbuilding purposes. Their intentions were to construct and launch vessels just as rapidly as labor conditions will permit and the premises are showing a great deal of enterprise in the undertaking.

W. M. S. Night in Providence Church. Last Sunday evening was W. M. S. Night in Providence Methodist church. Mrs. (Rev.) C. Jost, president of the society, conducted the service, and a most interesting programme was provided, consisting in part of a historical sketch of the society by Mrs. W. A. Fowler read by Mrs. F. H. Fowler; a paper by Miss Jost, exercise by the girls of the Mission Band, and readings by Mrs. H. S. McCreedy, Mrs. Fred E. Bath and Mrs. A. R. Reynolds. Appropriate music was furnished by the choir of the church, and the whole service was bright and inspiring.

Memorial Service. A memorial service for the late Pte. Florus Fehdahl, 25th Battalion, C. E. F., who was killed in action last April, will be held in the school house at 3 o'clock next Sunday afternoon, commencing at 3 o'clock. For some time the hope was entertained that a mistake had been made by the military officers, hence this delay in holding the memorial service. Confirmation of the sad news was received last week.

Wednesday Night's Show. Mr. J. E. Cripps, the popular proprietor of the Bijou Theatre, Digby, arrived here Wednesday from Middleton in connection with the war picture "Smiling the Hindenburg Line," which was shown in the Primrose Theatre, Queen street, that evening, to a fairly good house. The marine pictures in connection with the show were particularly good. Mr. Cripps left Thursday for Bear River.

Brought Home For Interment. The remains of John Cromwell, who died in Boston on Sunday, Nov. 9th, aged 78 years, arrived in Weymouth last Wednesday. The funeral took place the same afternoon. His son, Mr. F. O. Cromwell, accompanied the remains. He leaves seven sons and three daughters.

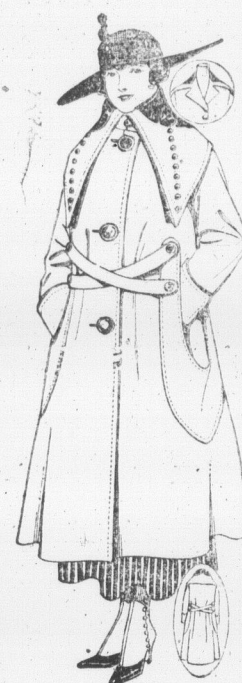
