Sample X—Dark color, with dark muddy deposit on standing, has an acid and slightly bitter taste, contains Cinchonine but no Quinine. Is made with an acid wine, not sherry.

No. 3—Campbell's—Light color, clear, with no deposit, contains Disulphate of Quinine in the proportion of 1 grain to two fluid ounces. Is made with sound sherry wine.

Entrance money of horses proved ineligible will be forfeited.

All entries to be made in writing: such entry to specify owner's name. Also horse's name, age, color, sex, sire and dam of the horse, with entrance money, addressed to the Secretary.

Jockeys must appear in proper costume, otherwise they will not be allowed to mount.

Races to be run under Dominion Rules. The Judges' decision to be final in all cases.

In the handicaps, weights will be declared at 7 o'clock p.m. the evening before each day's races: and acceptance must be made each evening with the Secretary, at 8 o'clock, p.m.

Races to commence each day at 1 o'clock, p.m.

THURSDAY—First Race: \$200.—Trotting Purse—For Dominion bred horses that have never beaten 3 minutes; mile heats, 3 in 5. \$150 to first, 50 to second.

Second Race: \$200.—Running Purse—Dominion bred horses. Dash of 1 1/2 miles: \$150 to first, 50 to second.

Third Race: \$200.—Running Purse—Open to all; mile heats, 3 in 5. \$150 to first, 50 to second.

Fourth Race: \$200.—Trotting Purse—Horses that have never beaten 2:32. Mile heats 3 in 5. \$150 to first, 50 to second.

Rules and Regulation

The races to be governed by the Rules of the Dominion Turf Association.

Riders to appear in full Jockey Costume and to be named at the time of entry.

All entries to be made in writing, such as to specify age, name, color, sex, sire and dam with the owner's name—such entry to be closed in a sealed envelope, with the entry money addressed to the Secretary.

The Association have determined to race no conditional entries, and insist upon the entry money accompanying the nomination.

Three horses to enter and two to start. Entrance Fee, ten per cent. of first money. Horses eligible on the evening of the 12th June.

All entries to be made not later than 9:30 the evening of Monday, the 12th of June, at the Turf Club House.

The Great Western and Grand Trunk Railways have kindly consented to carry passengers from all stations west of Toronto, to and from London, during the meeting, for one and a half fares.

The Great Western Railway will run a train on each day of the races, from London Station to the Race Course at about 3 o'clock, fare and fro, 10 cents.
