The touch is light and even. Being specially designed for accompanying purposes, solo stops are necessarily few in number; on the great organ, however, we have two, viz.: flute harmonique and clarabella. The composition pedals, etc., are arranged in such a manner as to render their use comparatively easy. It is impossible to say anything definite with regard to quality of tone till the instrument is finished, but, judging from a partial trial satisfactory results are to be expected.
