Recently Dr. Zahm made this statement as to his position:—

"I have been put down as Liberat, and in a way I may be called one. But when it comes to a question of faith and dogma I am as vigorous an ultramontane as the most radical of numerical ways as the most radical of any critics, who seem to think that because a man is intolerant of error he should be intolerant of persons and that a man who is liberal with individuals on controverted questions must necessarily be heterodox.
