Londox, 5th.—In the House of Commons this evening Mr. Sullivan, Attorney General for Ireland, moved for leave to bring in a bill to disable the present Mayor of the city of Cork from acting as a magistrate. Mr. Sullivan then proceeded to give the reason for the introduction of the bill. He gave a history of the disloyal conduct of the Mayor, up to its culmination in the inflammatory language used at the dunner recently given in Cork to Warren and Costello, and said that after much consideration Government had come to the conclusion that the present step was advisable. Several members de-precated the course of the Government as a stretch of Constitutional power—an ordinary action at law being open to it for remedy.

Sir John Gray, member for Kilkenny, and Mr. Maguire, M. P. for Cork, urged the necessity of giving the Mayor full opportunity for meeting the charge made against him. They complained that the action of the Government was based solely upon newspaper reports.

Mr. Disraeli deprecated as imprudent the release of the Fenian prisoners. If action for seditious language had been taken earlier the present step would not have become necessary. He would not oppose the introduction of the bill, but urged the House to consider well the step proposed and the constitutional question involved.

Mr. Fortescue, Chief Secretary for Ireland, assured the House that every facility would be given to the Mayor and his friends to reply. The Government would take care not to give any grounds for complaints of injustice in the management.

Prince Napoleon, who is not wanted in France during the elections, is to be sent on his travels again by an imperative order of the head of the family. It is stated " with certainty" that he is going for a cruise in the Adriatic.
