With the section with a company of the Covernment respecting the administration of Dominion Lands, Public Notice is hereby given:—

1. The Regulations of the 14th of October, 1879, were reconded by order of this Executincy the Government fenetal in Commel, on the 3-th day of May instant, and the following regulations for the disposal of agricultural lands substituted therefor:

2. The even numbered sections within the Canadian Pacific Railway Belt—that is to say, lying within twenty-four rules on each side of the line of the said Railway, excepting those which may be required for wood-lets in connection with settlers or prairie lands within the said belt, or which may be otherwise specially dealt with by the Governor in Conneil—shall be held exclusively for homesteads and pre-emptions. The odd-numbered sections within the said belt are Connation. Pacific Railway lands, and can only be acquired from the Company.

3. The pre-emptions entered within the said belt of 24 miles on each side of the Connation. Pacific Railway, up to and including the 4st and 2st according to the disposal at the rate of 22.50 per actre; four-tenths of the purchase money, with interest on the latter at the rate of six per cent, per annum, to be paid at the end of three years from the date of entry, the remainder to be paid in six equal mistalments annually from and after the said date, with interest at the rate above mentioned on such portions of the purchase money as may from time to time remain unpaid, to be paid with each instalment.

4. From and after the gist day of December next the price shall remain the said belt, or within the corresponding belt of any branch line of the said Railway, but shall be paid in one sum at the end of three years, or as such earlier period as the claimant may have acquired a filter to his homestead quarter-section.

10. The price and terms of payment of odd-numbered sections and pre-captions, above set forth, shall not apply to persons who have settled in any one of the several belts described in the said Regulations of the 14th October, 1670, hereby rescinded, but who have not obtained entries for their lands, and who may establish a right to purchase such odd-numbered sections or pre-emplaions, as the case may be, at the price and on the terms respectively fixed for the same by the said Regulations.

Timber for Stillers.

11. The system of wood lots in prairie townships shall be continued—that is to say homestead settlers having no timber on their own lands, shall be permitted to purchase wood lots in area not exceeding 20 acres each, at a uniform rate of \$5 per acre, to be paid in each.

each, at a uniform rate of \$5 per acre, to be paid in cash.

12. The provision in the next preceding paragraph shall apply also to seitlers on prairie sections bought from the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, in cases where the only wood lands available have been laid-out on even-numbered sections, provided the Railway Company agree to reciprocate where the only timber in the locality may be found on their lands.

13. With a view to encouraging settlement by cheapening the cost of huliding material, the Government reserves the right to grant license from time to time, under and in accordance with the provisions of the "Dominion Lands Act," to cut merchartable timber on any lands owned by it within surveyed townships; and settlement upon, or sale of any lands covered by such license, shall, for the time being, be subject to the operasettlement upon, or sale of any lands covered by such license, shall, for the time being, be subject to the opera-con of the same.

Sales of Lunds to Individuals or Corporations for Colonization.

14. In any case where a company or individual applies for lands to colonize, and is willing to expend capital to contribute towards the construction of facilities for communication between such lands and existing settlements, and the Government is satisfied of the good faith and ability of such company or individual to carry out such undertaking, the odd-numbered sections in case of lands outside of the Canadian Pacific Railway Belt, or of the Belt of any branch line or lines of the same, may be sold to such company or individual at half price, or & perare, in cash. In case the lands applied for be situated within the Canadian Pacific Railway Belt, the same principle shall apply so far as one-half of each even-numbered section may be sold to the company or individual at the price of &1.25 per acre, to be paid in cash. The company or individual will further be protected up to the extent of &250,0, with six per cent. thereon till paid, in the case of advances made to place families or homesteads, under the provisions of section for the amendments to the Dominion Lands Act herein before mentioned.

(a.) That the company or individual, as the case may be, shall, in the case of lands entaile of the sail Cauadian Parific Railway Bott, within three years of the date of the agreement with the Govern-tion, place two-solitors on each of the old-numbered sections, and also two on homesteads on each of the even-numbered sections embraced in the

(c.) That on the promotors falling within the joind faced, to place the prescribed number of settlers, the Governor in Council may cancel the sale and the privilege of colonization, and resume possession of the lands as may be deemed experient.

(d) That it be distinctly under tood that thipolicy shall only apply to schemes for colonization of the public lands by Emiliantz from Great Britain or the European Confinent.

18. Such leases shall be for a period of twenty one years, at d in accordance otherwise with the provisions of Section eight of the Amendment of the Dominion Lands Act passed at the last Session of Parliament, learning for mentioned.

In all cases, the aten included in a lease shall be in proportion to the quantity of five stock kept thereon, at the rate of ten nerve of land to one head of stock; and the facture in any case of the leases the pace the requisite stock upon the land atitha three years from the granting of the lease, or in sinke quently ministrating the proper ratio of stock to the area of the leasehold, shall justify the Covernor in Council in cano ling such ace, or in diminishing proportionally the area contained therein.

20. On pacing the required proportion of stock within the limits of the leavehold, the issue shall have the privilege of purchasing, and receiving a patent for, a quantity of land covered by such leave, on which to construer the buildings necessary in connection therewith, not to exceed the pad which made a few sets of the carea of the leavehold, which latter shall in no sing a case oxceed 100,000 ceres.

21. The rental for a leavehold shall in all cases be at the rate of 8th per atomin for each thous

sere, payable in cash.
