Question No. 629—Mr. Coates:

Has a decision been reached by the government with regard to the salaries of members of the Canadian Penitentiary Service as a result of meetings which were held by members of the Service with officials of the government and, if so, what was that decision?

Hon. G. J. McIlraith (President of the Privy Council): Yes.

The Government has agreed, at the request of the Civil Service Association of Canada to have an independent job evaluation study carried out with regard to the various positions in the Penitentiaries Service. This study will be carried out with the help of outside

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consultants. Salary levels for different categories of employment will be reviewed on the basis of this job evaluation study, and any changes which the Government decides, as a consequence of such study, to make from salary levels already announced will be given retroactive effect to April 1, 1964.
