Mr. MacInnis (Cape Breton South): I should like to ask the minister to explain a remark he made in answer to a question about Valcartier camp, and whether there was an artillery range there. I waited until I saw the report in *Hansard* before—

The Chairman: I apologize for interrupting the hon. member, but there is a little more noise than usual in the chamber and it is difficult for the Chair to hear what the hon. member is saying.

Mr. MacInnis (Cape Breton South): Can the minister explain his reference to the fact that the range at Valcartier is congested with unexploded shells, and practically no firing can be done? Since there is no artillery or mortar range there can he explain why unexploded shells are congesting that range and how they got there?

Mr. Hellyer: Well, I understand there is a variety of shells of various kinds going back the whole 50 years since the camp was in operation, and that they are pretty well concentrated in one major hill which exists in the present camp.

Mr. MacInnis (Cape Breton South): I am sorry, but I could not hear the reply the minister has given.

The Chairman: Would the Minister of National Defence repeat the answer which he gave to that question?

Mr. Hellyer: I am sorry, did the hon. gentleman not hear the answer?

Mr. MacInnis (Cape Breton South): No.

Mr. Hellyer: I said I understood there was a variety of shells, including mortar shells, going back for some years, all concentrated in one area, I think the Pinky Mountain area. It is a condition inside the camp which is extremely limited.

Mr. Crouse: Mr. Chairman, yesterday I directed a question to the minister, as reported at page 1608 of *Hansard*, relative to the signal station which is now located at Albro Lake in Dartmouth and its relocation in Mill Cove in Lunenburg County. The minister indicated that he would reply to the question I asked, and I wonder whether he is prepared to do so at this time.

Mr. Hellyer: Mr. Chairman, this transfer is taking place. Did my hon. friend have a specific question with respect to it—I have forgotten? It is being transferred from Albro Lake to Blandford, as he suggested.
