(Royal Canadian Mounted Police) and the Prime Minister's and Privy Council offices as follows: The purchase of the 1974 vehicle was part of the original plan to have one vehicle for the protection of the Prime Minister and the second to be available for backup purposes when the first car is being serviced or repaired, and also for security of V.I.P.'s during state visits. When he was made aware of the plan, the Prime Minister insisted that the second vehicle not be bought until the matter be reconsidered by the R.C.M.P. and a written recommendation be made by the R.C.M.P. Such a recommendation was made by memorandum referred to below. In this light, the word "insistance" has been interpreted to mean "strong recommendation", and part 1 of the question has been answered in this vein. 1. (a) It is contrary to constitutional principles to identify individual public servants in matters of this kind. There were five officers of the R.C.M.P., involving the then commissioner, involved. (b) Following financial approval by Treasury Board, the then commissioner approved the purchase on May 4, 1974. (c) Privy Council was advised by the Director of Protective Policing in a memorandum dated November 7, 1973. (d) The Royal Canadian Mounted Police's recommendation to approve in principle the purchase of a second armoured limousine to provide security to the Prime Minister and visiting heads of state was approved by the Solicitor General and sub-

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mitted to Treasury Board for financial approval on March 8, 1973. (e) The officer in charge, Material Management Branch, Royal Canadian Mounted Police, advised the Department of Supply and Services by memorandum dated July 23, 1973.
