EGYPT IS NOW BRITISH PROTECTORATE—TURKISH SUZERAINTY ENDS

BRITAIN DECLARES POWER OF PORTE AT END IN EGYPT

British Protectorate Established, and Lieut-Col. Sir Henry McMahon Appointed High Commissioner—Necessary Defensive Measures To Be Taken.

New Commissioner, Now Foreign Secretary to India, Has Had Distinguished Career As Soldier and Statesman in the East.

Kaiser's Navy Plans Export On Huge Scale

Canadian Press Despatch, KÖLN, Dec. 17, 4:30 p.m.—On his arrival at Rome, Prince Von Buelow, the former imperial chancellor, and now ambassador to Italy, was informed of the bombardment of the English coast by German ships, but showed no surprise. He said that the achievement had been arranged for prior to his departure from Berlin. He added: "This is simply the prelude to what the German fleet is soon to undertake, which may astonish the world."

Salisbury, England, Dec. 17.—The first Canadian Light Infantry, in training at Winchester, will be the first Canadian regiment to be ordered on active service. The indications are that the permanent units of the Royal Canadian Dragoons, Lord Strathcona's Horse and the Royal Canadian Artillery will soon go to the front.

BRITAIN DECLARES POWER OF PORTE AT END IN EGYPT

London, Dec. 17, 9:45 p.m.—The official press bureau tonight issued the following statement concerning the making of Egypt a British protectorate: "His Britannic Majesty's principal secretary of state for foreign affairs gives notice that in view of a state of war arising out of the action of Turkey, Egypt is placed under the protection of His Majesty, and will henceforth constitute a British protectorate. The suzerainty of Turkey over Egypt is thus terminated and His Majesty's government will adopt all measures necessary for the defence of Egypt and the protection of its inhabitants and interests. The king has been pleased to approve the appointment of Lieut-Col. Sir Arthur Henry McMahon, who has long and varied experience as a political officer in India and other parts of the east. He has been foreign secretary to the Government of India since 1911."

Canopus Lured Enemy's Fleet Into Disaster

Van Spee Did Not Suspect Nearness of Formidable Squadron. MET DEATH GALLANTLY

Scharnhorst's Crew Cheered As They Sank—Two Hundred Survivors.

German Press Despatch, BERNES, Dec. 17.—The detailed accounts of the naval battle on Dec. 8 when four German cruisers were sent to the bottom received here today from Puerto Gallenas, Patagonia. According to these accounts the Germans were on their way to seize the Falkland Islands, British possessions, when they came unexpectedly upon a lone British warship. The other members of the British fleet were taking on supplies from neighboring islands at the time. Before the Germans were aware of the strength of their opponents these ships closed on them and the fate of Admiral Van Spee's squadron was soon sealed. The story of the battle was told by two members of the British steamer Orona, which arrived at Punta Arenas from Callao, Peru. They say the losses of the British were placed at eighteen.

Violation of Neutrality Alleged—British Steamers Stay in Port.

U.S. MAY NOT OPPOSE EXPORT OF MUNITIONS

Measure Introduced by Senator Hitchcock Not Favored by Cabinet.

Six Cruisers Believed to Have Participated in Shelling.

Canadian Press Despatch, LONDON, Dec. 17, 9:55 p.m.—The people of the English coast town of Scarborough, which was shelled on Dec. 15, which a relay were bombarded by German cruisers, resumed their ordinary occupations today. The only difficulty reported in the regular routine of this season of the year was the arrival of a crowd of camouflaged boats, which remained in the harbor of the town until the return of those who had fled on the night of the attack, and busy mechanics who were busy at work repairing the damage done by the shells. The Mayor of Scarborough placed the town in a state of emergency, and the people were advised to remain in their homes. It was hardly necessary to say that the British government had issued orders that the export of munitions to Germany should be stopped. The attention they attracted, the citizens seemed to be going about their business in quite a usual way, and it was not until the evening that the damage done by the shells was reported. The excitement of the people of Scarborough was much the same as that of the shelled towns. There are no signs of excitement, and the only effect of the bombardment has been to demand that the British government should not allow munitions to be shipped to Germany. The British government has declined today to make any comment upon the merits of the measure, and no other official of the administration has discussed it.
