SATURDAY'S MOTORCYCLE RACES

The Worshipful Mayor Church has consented to be the starter of the International Derby, which is the sensational 25-mile motor-pace bicycle race feature of the opening meet at the Motorrome Saturday night. The starters in this thrilling battle will include four of the world's best cyclists, one of them Ernie Eys of Australia, holder of the professional sprint record of the world for two and three miles. He has ridden two miles unpaced in 4:01 and three miles unpaced in 6:08. Other great features that will make it with the crowd will be the international bicycle match race, for which four regular Buffalo riders are coming, and two motorcycle dashes of five and ten miles which will be run off without delay. The race will be pleased to know that Leonard, the Cleveland star, has been asked to ride again this year and has been told to come for these contests. The Buffalo riders will include Sayward of Brighton Beach, Hankman and Bartlett, while Harold Cole will use his new

Cyclone racing mount. There are four-teen motorcycles at the track, so that delays will be sidestepped. Over seventy-five of the local amateurs have been entered for the one-mile bike handicap and other races.

Aid Louis Rubenstein of Montreal has accepted the invitation to start the bicycle features, while the music for the opening ceremonies will be provided by the Q.O.R. Band. The reserved seat plan has been opened at Mooney's, 33 West King street.

VICTORIA QUOTING CLUB.

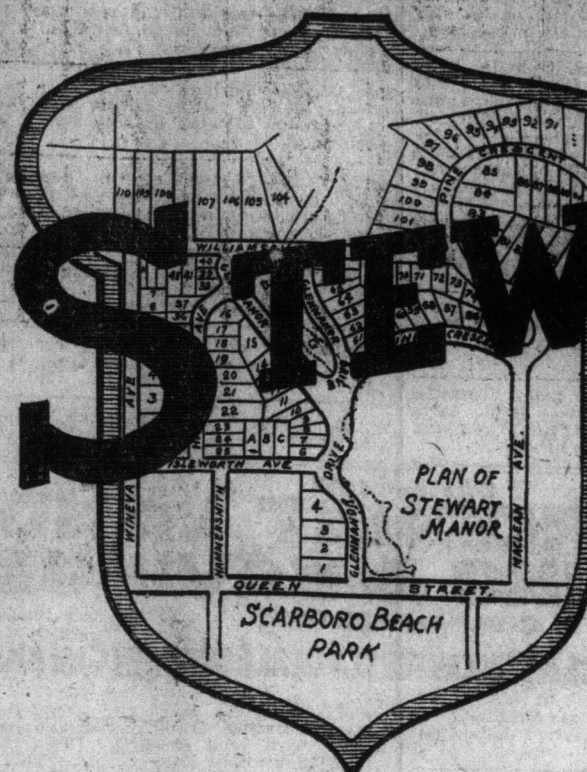

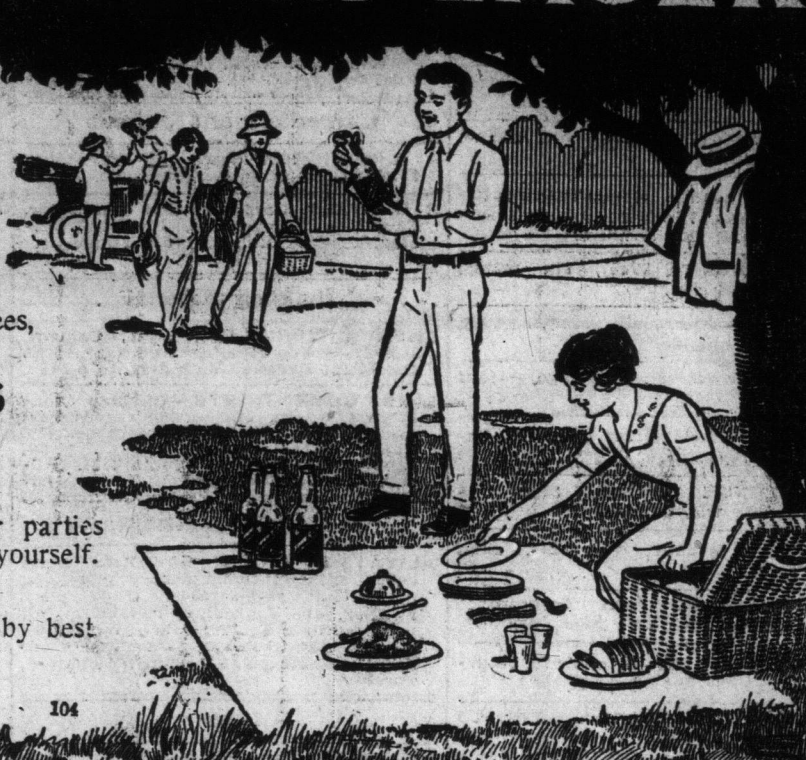
