**M'NEAL WINS FROM BROWNIE CARSLAKE**

Henikman Disqualified in Race With Burtchael—Saturday's Results.

Brownie Carslake, the Australian motorcycle favorite, traveled in hard luck at the Motordrome Saturday for the start of the international match series for the \$1500 purse. He was scheduled to meet J. A. McNeal of Omaha for the first time anywhere and at the last moment his machine went wrong. He was compelled to use an ordinary racing machine instead of his eight-cylinder Indian against McNeal's Excelsior, and the result was a comparatively easy win for McNeal in straight heats at four miles. McNeal's times were 2:45 and 2:42 for each four miles. The wildly excited crowd of 5000 people gave Carslake a grand reception, but a huge cheer rent the air when McNeal succeeded in establishing a new Canadian one-mile record of 38.25 in an exhibition against time. The old record was 39.45. McNeal flew at the rate of 85-90 miles per hour during the four laps. Later, when he started from scratch in the ten-mile race, he was again in the lead at the rate of 38 miles per hour. He did not win this event, however, because his chain broke under the terrible pull and made a deep cut in McNeal's back. The flying pieces also smashed the saddle upon which McNeal was sitting.

An exciting episode occurred when Referee J. M. Scott disqualified Henikman of Detroit for trying to run his rival Burtchael of Atlanta, up the track wall in the ten-mile handicap. The southerner could not pass Henikman because of the latter's switching, but the purse went to Burtchael on the referee's decision. The time for this ten miles was 7:10-2.5.

George Wright swept away all doubt as to his ability as a motor-race follower when he won the two three-mile starts of the motor-race fixture in fast time. Norm Webster, his club-mate, came strong in several sprints, but Wright always had enough in reserve to hold off the challenger. Wright's best time was 4:22.

Art Spencer also scored a great victory when he sprinted through the quarter-mile bicycle handicap and gained the lead about five feet from the finishing line. He rode a magnificent race, and it was appreciated by the crowd. The enthusiastic spectators held their breath while Henikman rode the last mile of the five-mile invitation race with the handicap of his gas-cart broken. In spite of the impossible handicap he won the race in the good time of 3:38.

His Worship Mayor Church was the guest of honor at the match race. Carslake's eight-valve racer will be in perfect shape, it is promised, for their second clash at the local track. Tuesday night. There will be no race meet at the Drome on the holiday night.
