TOPIC III.

HOW THE LAWS ARE MADE.

1. Legislation.

In the government of a country there are three kinds of work to be done. One is the making of the laws, and another is the carrying out of the law. The third kind of work is that which the courts do in deciding what the law is in particular cases that are brought before them.
