NO CONCESSIONS FOR RUSSIA.

ST. PETERSBURG, Dec. 7 .- (Can. Press).-The semi-official Rossia in a two-column editorial on representative William Sulzer's proposal to abrogate the Russian treaty, will say tomorrow in part:

"The news is no surprise, as a similar motion was made in 1937. The prohibition of foreign Jews, irrespective of nationality, from entering Russia, as well as Russian Jews whi emigrated without permission was estab-lished by law in March 23 and August 11, 18.6. The Russo-American treaty eight years later contains no provision with respect to a modification of the existing law for American Jews. American Jews err in supposing that Russia has introduced new restrictions with regard to them.

"All Jewish business men and all others engaged in an occupation which is not regarded as undesirable, may enter and reside in Russia for six month. But the sovereign right not to admit undesirables cannot be disputed and is exercised strictly by the
