FOUND BODY OF

Was Floating Upright Near Ashbridge's Bay Gap-Probably in Water Since Last Summer.

The body of a young Chinese boy. who looks to be no more than 18 or 19 stable Beach about 150 vards southwest of the gap in Ashbridge's Bay yesterwas standing upright and was in a badly decomposed state. It would appear, both from the appearance of the body itself and from the clothes on it that the drowning, if drowning it was, occurred last summer. This fact is almost positive, as the clothes are summer weight. There was no coat on, and but a light summer shirt and light underdrawers and knickers, with stockings and one shoe, made up the attire of the dead youth. The pockets were filled with sand and the sum of seven cents was in one of these pockets. There were no identification marks on either clothes or body.

Constable Beach was patrolling along in his skiff when he saw the cadaver floating upright in the water. He took it aboard and rowed to the shore, telephoned police headquarters and had the dead wagon some out. The body was taken to the morgue, where it now is awaiting identification.

remors Lasted for Half a Minute-Last One Happened in 1904—Due to Slipping of Earth's Strata

Toronto's second earthquake during the past few years occurred about 7.46 o'clock yesterday morning. The tremors lasted for half a minute. Reports from people living in the four corners of the city state that the vibrations were felt distinctly. Some houses shook and windows rattled. The quake caused a rumbling noise like a wagon passing over a rough roadway. No windows were broken in any buildings, despite the fact that Hamilton suffered slightly in this way. The seismograph in the meteorological office, registered

in this way. The seismograph in the meteorological office registered a "sharp shake" at 7.52, the tremore lasting from 20 to 30 seconds.

Local scientists were puzzled by the visitation. Prof Parks of Toronto University said that two causes of earthquakes are volcanic action and a slipping of the earth's strata. The shock, he believed, was due to the slipping of the strata. Altho the formation underlying Toronto is very old, no part of the earth, he said, was entirely free from earthquakes, as there was a constant setting and readjustment of the earth's strata which often caused distinct tremors.

This city was visited by an earthquake on Sept. 14, 1994, a slight shock being recorded. Another quake occurred here about 25 years ago.

BIG STRIKE OF BRICKMAKERS HAVERSTRAW, N.Y., May 27.—(Can. Press) — Every brickyard along the river front here, where 2000 men are employed, is affected by a strike which began to-day. Ever since the opening of the brick-paking season the men had been demanding 10 per cent. advance in the wages paid the previous season. Seeing no prospect of receiving the increase, the leaders called a strike this morning and forced a complete shut-down in every instance.
