had been submitted to the government officially, was the creation of a guard, which would include certain battalions from the overseas forces. If the division were organized, it would be on the system of voluntary enlistment.

The bill to amend the military pensions act in order to bring it into conformity with the northwest mounted police act was considered in committee. General Mewburn explained that the C. E. F. had obtained a large number of recruits from the ranks of the permanent force and about 100 of these had obtained commissions. There was, therefore, a larger number of officers than there was room for in the establishment, and the bill proposed to alter the years term to a ten years term at the end of which the surplus of officers might be retired.

To greet the strike-breakers, but no rough work was attempted, the crowd with the utmost good nature urging the employees to quit work and come along with the strikers. Leaders stated last night that they realized that only thru the agency of well-conducted strike operations peacefully administered could they expect to accomplish their aims, and that they would continuously urge such clean methods upon the strikers. Reports of starving women and babies were discredited at the machinists' headquarters, and it was pointed out that such action would work harm to the workers themselves, and would therefore be ineffectual as a means of forcing any issue.

More Strikes

Metal workers at the Pendrith plant, Queen and Givens streets, have joined the metal trades strike. While the men of the Street Railwaymen's Union have gone on record as championing the fight of the metal trades for a 44 hour week, there is nothing in their resolution to show that they will go out on strike if a general strike is called.

Paul Charbonneau and E. A. York, representing the Metal Polishers' Union, have penned a tart note to Messrs. Parsons, Brown and Co. respecting the circular from that firm to retail merchants alleged to warn the retailers against supplying credit to strikers.

Boiler-makers and helpers in the Toronto Railroad shops have voted against the proposed general strike according to W. H. Spaul, 290 Dundas street, secretary of their union.
