## OUT OF CHILD'S HEART **WOVE WORLD OF ROMANCE**

### Prof. Sykes of New York Lectures on Robert Louis Stevenson-Popular Audience at Varsity.

Prof. Sykes of Columbia University had a splendid reception last night at the university, and tho the heat was like Samoa the chemical amphitheatre was filled. The subject of Prof. Sykes' lecture was Robert Louis Stevenson, and he managed to convey a wonderfully adequate impression of the spirit and genius of the body-shackled romancer, essayist and poet. Without lavish quotations he also touched one after another almost all the dominant chords in the range of the last of the Scottish masters.

Beginning with Stevenson's father, Piof. Sykes contrasted the solid character of the lighthouse-builder with that of the sensitive artist, whose own regret was noted in being a builder in words and not in granite. Perhaps in "Treasure Island" and the "Essays" and "Poems" he kindled lamps which will outshine Bell Rock and Skerr

Stevenson's work grew out of the imagination of childhood, as the "Child's Garden of Verses" indicate. If the world were as full of the spirit of romance as are Stevenson's books we would all be as happy as kings, thought the lecturer, and he quoted "The Lamplighter" to fill in a touch of tenderness. Stevenson, the writer, was the imaginative child writ large.

Stevenson was not a student, as the lecturer put it, at Edinburgh University, but the "Speculative Society" there had its part there in calling forth genius. Stevenson described himself as "lean, ugly, idle and unpopular," But when he walked out it was with two books in his pocket, one to read and one to write in, and as he walked he tried to put in words everything that met his eye. Like Keats, he looked on fine phrases as a lover, differing in this from Scott, and hence grew his mastery of style. This was evident by his perfect command of figures, his rhythm, the flavor and association of words in his writings.

Being a Scotchman, he was a preacher, but he took the essay for his pulpit and the joy of living for his text. no dessert.

But the best happiness is out of doors.

"I'd rather be a bargee," he declares 'than occupy any position under heaven that required attendance in an office. an open, sensitive heart, so that at the end one might say:

### "Life is over: life was gay. We have come the primrose way."
