Montreal, Sept. 21.—(Special.)—One Washington Government official has discovered that there is a more widespread sentiment annexation to the United States, says the Washington special correspondent to The Heraid. He is Harry S. Heath, First Assistant Postmaster-General. Mr. Heath has been spending his vacation in Nova Scotia, amping out, so that his opportunities for bservation may be imagined. He is a personal friend of President McKinley and was appointed to his present office because he won the regard of the President years ago as a newspaper man in Onio. Mr. heath thus gives his impression, derived from his camping out experience in Nova Scotia:
