during the terrible suspense of the past few days. No other civilized nation on earth save Russia perhaps, would be most uncomplainingly the deprivation of news which the British Government has seen fit to impose upon the world.

The obvious inference is that the effect of Monday's reverse at Ladysmith has been the cause of trouble in Cape Colony since this has been feared from the first by all who have a knowledge of the African continent. It is reported under Tuesday's date that a force of about 4000 Orange Free Staters at Cape Colony, such a movement is full of peril to the British cause, for, with the assistance of the Boers, they would be able to take Ladysmith.

The public and press are doing their best to take a hopeful view of the difficulties, but there are certain ugly facts which, with all they imply, must be faced. The Boers are virtually masters of Natal. The Orange Free Staters have destroyed the railway bridge there, thus completing the severance of the Orange River. This would be a civil war added to Great Britain's campaign against the allied Republics, and even the Boers' army corps might not suffice to deal with the situation.

But all England now expects that Gen. Buller will evacuate himself, primarily Gen. Buller's relief. GOOD HEARTS WIDE OPEN. London Theatres Giving Benefits for the Families of Victims of the Boer War.

London, Nov. 5.—The theatres here are engaged in a spirited contest of benefits for the war victims. Charles Wyndham's announcement that he will devote the receipts of the first night of his new theatre, the "East Lynde," to this purpose has resulted in an immense demand for seats, single stalls selling for as much as £20 each.

Material Aid from France. For the Boers in Their Fight Against Britain—French Journalists Are Bitter. Paris, Nov. 5.—N.Y. Tribune Cable.—The popular sympathy for the Boers is taking practical shape under the direction of various committees, foremost among which is the Societe des Dames Francaises in the Rue Michel Ange, and the Ligue Comitee, at No. 21 Rue Artois, whose efforts are confined to legitimate aid for the wounded and the accumulation of funds for widows and orphans.

Recruiting offices under Colonel Montell have been clandestinely opened, and a French legion for the Boers is being organized. The Boers are being supplied with uniforms and equipments and are being trained by French officers. A Lieutenant of Chasseurs a Cheval has resigned his commission to accept the French legion for the Boers.

That Fight at Farquhar's Farm. Durban, Nov. 2.—(Delayed in transmission.)—The official report shows that 843 members of the Gloucestershire Regiment and of the Royal Irish Rifles were missing, as the result of the engagement on Farquhar's Farm. The Boers' losses were 100 men, including 70 killed and 30 wounded.

A Regiment from Cuba is Being Formed With the Object of Aiding Britain Against the Boers. Havana, Nov. 4.—A regiment is in process of formation here, the services of which, when its organization is completed, will be offered to Great Britain against the Boers.

Wounded at Cape Town. Cape Town, Nov. 2.—(Delayed in transmission.)—The arrival of the British wounded men from the battle of Ladysmith, which occurred on the 28th of October, has created a scene of popular enthusiasm on the part of a large crowd that gathered to see the wounded men.
