London, Jan. 10.—The negotiations toward the formation of another American iron and steel combination, which have been carried on recently in London, reached a point this evening, when their culmination became practic-

ally assured. The companies intending to amalgamate are the Canadian Steel Company, the Lake Superior Power Company, the American Sheet Steel Company, the Otis Steel Company, the Pittsburg Steel Company and the Wellman Scaver Company of Cleveland. Combined with these, if the deal is completed, will be several English firms. which will take part in the enterprise, financially and commercially. At this evening's conference there were present Mr. Seaver, president of the Wellman Seaver Company; Mr. Pew, president of the Canadian Steel Company; Mr. Douglas of Philadelphia, president of the Lake Superior Power Company; Mr. Wicks, president of the American Sheet Steel Company; Mr. Hand manufact director of the Otic Steel Company and Mr. Wicks, Head, managing director of the Otis Steel Company, and Mr. Huber of the Pittsburg Steel Company. The moving spirit in the undertaking appears, to be Mr. Pew. It is the intention of the projectors to erect plants at various places, with the Welland Canal as an outlet. The object is to minimize exditures, and, acting with the English co-operators, to secure markets here and elsewhere. The project may be termed an English-American-Canadian combination, to take advantage of existing opportunities. It is freely discussed in the English press. 
