EX-LONDONER IS NEW UNION HEAD

Rev. W. J. Doherty Chosen President by Junior Clergy Organization.

The second annual meeting of the Junior Clergy Union of the Anglican Synod was held yesterday afternoon at Cronyn Hall, when the election of officers for the coming year took place.

The president, Rev. T. Bart Howard, of Brantford, occupied the chair.

Rev. Arthur Carlisle conducted the devotional exercises, after which matters of general interest to the younger clergy of the church were discussed.

A paper on "Methods of Training Candidates for Confirmation" was read by Rev. W. J. Doherty, of Hensall. Reports on the recommended text books were received from Rev. W. H. Snellgrove, Rev. Mr. Windsor and Rev. C. W. Saunders, of Lucknow.

"General Reading of a Clergyman" was a subject on which there was considerable discussion, in which all present took part.

The Junior Clergy Union is one of the bodies of the Anglican Synod, which has been very little heard of, but it has now become a very important organization, and has proved itself to be thoroughly practical in every respect.

The graduates number eighty, and over one half of them were present at the annual meeting of the college last evening, and presided over by Rev. Dean Davis, rector of St. James' Church, South London.

The unanimous opinion of the gathering was that the Alumni Association should be reorganized, and that its meetings should be devoted to the consideration of all matters of interest to the clergy. hours of study will be from 8 o'clock until noon, the afternoons being left free for enjoying the boating, bathing and fishing privileges, for which Port Dover is famous. BOOMING THE PORT
