REPUBLIC NOT YET SOLID

Hopeful Spirit Prevailing and Confidence in Government Increases.

RETROGRAD. July 13.—Arthur Henderson, member of the British ware council and the labor member of the British delegation now visiting Russia, in a brief survey of conditions in this country said today that he is much impressed with the more hopeful spirit prevailing among the Russian people. This unmistakable improvement, he believed, was largely due to the increase of public confidence in the Government, the resumption of the offensive on the battlefront, a hetter understanding of the actions, and intentions of the Entente Allies, and a realization that the beneficial possibilities of the revolution were needlessly placed in risk by the forces of disorder.

Mr. Henderson did not suggest that all danger was over for, unfortunately, there were many indications showing that politically, financially and industrially the position of the country was so uncertain and complicated as to require the most skillful handling if a permanent improvement is to be obtained.
