SEVEN KILLED WHEN FLYER CRASHED INTO **AUTO NEAR DETROIT**

Bodies of Children Taken Off Pilot of Big Locomotive.

DETROIT, Oct. 14.—Seven persons were killed this afternoon when an obile in which they were riding was struck by a fast Michigan Central passenger train at Hartsig crossing, twelve miles north of Detroit.

The dead are Joseph Pohl. Mrs. Joseph J. Pohl, Mrs. George Harvey, Mary Pohl, 1 year and Thomas J Pohl, 3 years old, children of Mr. and Mrs. Pohl; Ralph Harvey, 3 years, and Helen Harvey, 5 years old, children o Harvey.

The automobile, driven by Pohl, was hit squarely by the passenger train. The party had left Detroit early in the PREMIER OF ALBERTA afternoon, and was returning home for supper.
