SURPLUS OF \$10,000 THIS YEAR FOR WESTERN FAIR; DIRECTORS FAVOR GROUNDS NEAR COVE

Financial Success of Exhibition Most Marked in 1917.

\$75,000 IN RECEIPTS

The Western Fair will this year have a surplus estimated from \$10,000 to \$15,000. This will bring the cash surplus of the association to more than \$50,000, probably \$55,000 at the present time, and boost the assets close to the \$125,000 mark.

The net surplus last year was \$12,500. The receipts, excluding the city grant of \$10,000 for the grandstand, were \$67,500. This year, it is reported, they are close to \$75,000. The expenses will be heavier, so the surplus will not be much greater than \$20,000, although later returns may increase the amount. There can be no accurate figures obtained. WAR SAVINGS STAMPS TO GIVE EVERYONE CHANCE TO INVEST IN CERTIFICATES AND HELP WIN

Series in Course of Preparation Whereby Subscriptions of 25 Cents May Be Made—Certificates Are Bringing In Money Well.

Ottawa, Sept. 15.—The minister of finance announces that an issue of war savings stamps is in course of preparation. These stamps will be used in connection with a plan to interest those who are able to save only small amounts in the purchase of war savings certificates. Special war savings cards will be issued with stamps upon which the stamps purchased from time to time may be placed. When all the stamps are filled, the card will be taken to the postoffice and exchanged for a certificate entitling the holder to \$10 at the end of three years. The stamps will be sold at postoffices, will be of special design, and will contain a reproduction of the famous drawing "Canada Fighting" commemorating the achievements of the first Canadian contingent at Ypres.

CLOSED BARS WILL NEVER BE REOPENED, SAYS N.W. ROWELL

Has Strong Proof That Prohibition Is Success.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Toronto, Sept. 15.—Newton Rowell, secretary of the Ontario Temperance Society, said today in receipt of the strongest testimony from all parts of the province, of the great practical benefits which have resulted from the operation of the Ontario temperance act, during the past year.

The results have been so satisfactory that large numbers of those who were opposed to the adoption of the measure, are now its warm supporters. Thousands of wives and children are better clothed, better fed, and know more of the real meaning of home today than they ever knew before. Crime has been substantially reduced, the efficiency and earning power of the workers have been materially increased; business has been stimulated rather than depressed; and the whole country is enjoying freedom from the constant menace of the open bar. It is evident that the bar now closed will never be reopened in this province.

Vigorous and impartial enforcement of the law must be maintained, and the act must be strengthened where necessary, to make it more effective and to carry out its intent.

Our grateful appreciation is due to the men and women all over this province, whose untiring and unselfish labors through the years, made possible this great measure of social reform.

ALL EFFORTS OF FOEST ATTACK FRUSTRATED BY FRENCH FORCES

Enemy Driven From Trenches in Verdun Sector, Entered Earlier.

REPULSED IN CHAMPAGNE

And an Assault On Allies in Argonne Is Completely Checked.

Paris, Sept. 15.—French forces, after a battle last night, defeated the Germans from a greater part of the trenches which they had penetrated earlier in the day, north of Courcy Wood in the Verdun sector, the French war office announced today. Two surprise attacks launched by the Germans, north of Prose, in the Champagne region, were repulsed by the French. The text of the French statement follows:

"In Champagne we repulsed two surprise attacks made by the enemy north of Prose. There was great activity of the artillery in the region of Cornillet and Mont Boudry. In the Argonne an enemy attack on our positions, near Bouteville, was completely checked.

"On the bank of the River Meuse, after a combat, we ejected the enemy from the greater part of the eleven new trenches. The enemy had penetrated earlier in the day north of Caurelles. The night was calm."

GERMAN VERSION.

Berlin, Sept. 15.—Via London.—Artilery preparation which attained during the night, was followed by a British attack on the German positions in the Verdun sector. The attack was repulsed today. The attackers were frustrated by a German counter-attack, and a number of prisoners were taken.

FRANCE HAS BREAD ON SALE TO ALL AT BEFORE-WAR PRICES

Food Minister Explains How It Is Done.

FLOUR IS WHOLE WHEAT

Taxes Will Pay Part of Price Paid Farmer For the Wheat.

[BY W. S. FORREST.] [Special to The Advertiser.] Paris, Sept. 15.—The housewife is paying practically the same price for bread that she paid before the war. The only difference is that today's bread is of whole wheat flour. It is darker than the white loaf of the pre-war days.

The French food minister today explained to the United Press, for the first time, the reason for the increased prices for flour and bread. France dealt with the problem. The minister said: "We imported all necessary wheat. But even then, in view of transportation difficulties, the Government was obliged to regulate baking."

Bread-Eating Nation. "As the French are essentially a bread-eating nation, it was necessary to keep prices as low as possible. Therefore the only increase permitted was the rise to five cents of the usual four-cent loaf."

"All French bread is now of a standard weight of 250 grams, which is less than the 300-gram loaf which was formerly sold. Therefore, it was decided to pay the farmers the price they demanded for their wheat, although the flour from this grain is sold at former prices to the bakers."

"To cover the deficit a tax will soon be imposed on the agricultural population. This appears to be the only solution."

Bread Cards in October. "In October, bread cards will be introduced in France. They will allow a minimum daily allowance per capita of a pound of bread, with a maximum of a pound and four-fifths. The latter weight is for the working and agricultural classes, who are greater bread eaters than our townsmen."

"Experiments with potato bread have given excellent results. If the percentage of potato flour does not exceed twenty per cent, the quality of the loaf is not affected. The deficit which France is that the bakers are short-handed, and are unwilling to cook potato bread, which is mixing them with the wheat flour."

"In America where machinery is being more used in baking potato flour could easily be adopted."

NOT NECESSARY FOR GOVERNMENT TO TAKE OVER THE APPLE CROP

Ottawa, Sept. 15.—The fruit and vegetable committee has advised the food controller, after a careful study of the situation, that a satisfactory supply of apples can be secured to the public in Canada at a fair cost without the necessity of setting prices to the producer and that it is not necessary to take over the apple crop to secure distribution.

Sergeant Walked Up and With Revolver Silenced 45 Men With Seven Guns.

London, Sept. 15.—Further stirring stories of heroism are related in the Official Gazette in announcing the award of eleven new Victoria crosses. One of these is the splendid record of an officer of the Medical Corps.

"Capt. Noel Chavasse, late of the Medical Corps, though severely wounded early in the day, continued to perform his duties but went out repeatedly under heavy fire to search for and attend to the wounded. Although practically without food, with fatigue and faint with his wounds, he assisted a number of badly wounded men over difficult ground. His extraordinary energy and inspiring example were instrumental in rescuing many wounded men who would otherwise undoubtedly have succumbed. This devoted and gallant officer subsequently died of his wounds."

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BRITISH IMPROVE THEIR POSITIONS ON BELGIAN LINE

Disperse a German Attack, Catching It With Artillery Barrage.

FIGHT NEAR ST. JULIEN

Progress Made, and Some Teutons Taken Prisoner During Friday.

London, Sept. 15.—British troops last night made a slight advance on the Belgian front. The text of the statement reads:

"In the course of the night we improved our position slightly east of Westhoek. A strong party of the enemy yesterday evening attacked the enemy. Eighty bombs were dropped by our artillery barrage and were dispersed. Considerable activity continues to be shown by hostile artillery north of Langemark."

The official communication issued last night said:

Progress and Prisoners. "There was local fighting during the night in the neighborhood of the Westhoek, northeast of St. Julien. Our troops made good progress and have taken a few prisoners."

"The enemy's artillery was active today in the Lens sector. There was considerable artillery activity by both sides east of Ypres."

"Thursday the weather again was very unfavorable for aerial observation. Eighty bombs were dropped by our artillery on enemy billets, and east of Lens his troops in the open and in trenches were engaged by machine gun fire from a low altitude. There was a certain amount of air fighting under difficult conditions. Three of our machines are missing."

British Steamer Hears "S. O. S." On Friday Morning. An Atlantic Port, Sept. 15.—A British steamer that arrived here today reported that early in the morning it had received a wireless "S. O. S." call was heard, stating that the ship from which the message came was being shelled by a German submarine. The location being 65 miles east of Nantucket lightship. The name of the ship was not given, but it was a number of vessels, presumably the last half of the name, being caught.

WARNING GIVEN. An Atlantic Port, Sept. 15.—Additional information that a submarine was in the western Atlantic was brought by a British liner which arrived here today from an English port. Officers of the liner said that they had been instructed to water out for U-boats when near the American coast. There are a number of vessels, both sail and steam, of which the word "Abby" is a part of their names, now engaged in Atlantic trade.

MORE COAL FOR HOLLAND. London, Sept. 15.—The general manager of the Hague to Rotterdam, Limited, states that information has been received from German official quarters that the export of German coal to Holland is being resumed.

WEATHER PREVENTS RAISING OF QUEBEC BRIDGE SPAN AGAIN

Quebec, Sept. 15.—Weather conditions will prevent the raising of the central span of the Quebec bridge Saturday morning as scheduled. Last night a gale was blowing in Quebec, and the river was covered with whitecaps.

As the engineers require a perfectly calm river surface to facilitate the transfer of the span from the pontoons upon which it was constructed, and on which it will be towed from Silery, where the link now lies, it was decided late last night to postpone the attempted elevation till Sunday morning.

The high tide of the season taken place today, and it was depended upon to raise the structure to the required point it is possible to get it in the river. Some of this elevation will necessarily be lost on Sunday morning, but the engineers are confident that the chains to which the span will be attached will be easily equal to the extra strain.

GEN. KORNILOFF IS UNDER ARREST; ALSO GEN. LOKOMSKY

Latter Refused To Command Russian Armies After Former Was Deposed—Whether Korniloff Should Be Executed Is Question Worrying the Government.

Petrograd, Sept. 15.—Gen. Korniloff, leader of the recent rebellion against the Provisional Government, and Gen. Lokomsky, the commander of the northern front who refused to take command of the Russian armies after Korniloff was deposed, have been arrested.

NEW CABINET FORMED. Petrograd, Sept. 15.—Russia's political crisis has been solved after the cabinet resigned. It was announced today by the Russian official news agency, "the cabinet has been formed, and its composition will be made public tomorrow."

SHALL HE DIE? [By William G. Shepherd, Special to The Advertiser.] Petrograd, Sept. 15.—Korniloff misjudged Russia, therefore, it seems he must die. His fate has been officially decided today. He has not yet formally surrendered. But Petrograd sees only two courses open to him—suicide or surrender. The one means death just as certainly as the other in the view of the populace. Korniloff himself decried punishment of crime and mercy in the army. It was the main issue which he projected into the Moscow trial. He put it into effect at once. Probably a number of Russian private soldiers have already paid the penalty for fractions of discipline. It was at the Moscow conference that Korniloff announced his coup. He believed the idea sprang full-grown into his brain at the dramatic moment when the Russian commander stood on the platform in the city hall of Moscow, acclaimed a hero five minutes' tumultuous demonstration.

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
