Miss Florence Dewey and Sidney Martin Give Recital

Exceptional Program Presented at the Auditorium Before Large Audience.

A decidedly interesting and artistic program was presented at the Auditorium last evening by Miss Florence Dewey, violinist, and Mr. Sidney Martin, pianist. Both are members of the London Conservatory of Music teaching faculty, under whose auspices the recital was given.

The opening number, Handel's Sonata in E-major, for violin and piano, which showed perfect unity of interpretation, was followed by a group of smaller numbers, amongst them the ever-popular "Spring Song" of Mendelssohn and "The Swan" of Saint-Saens.

Miss Dewey in these numbers displayed a clear, true tone and musical appreciation of their text.

Her other selections, which consisted of Svendsen's "Romance," "Round of the Goblins," by Bizet, and a group of Kreisler numbers, were performed with excellent technique, pure intonation, grace and ease. It was a program that demanded variety of style and interpretation, but Miss Dewey proved herself quite equal to all its demands.

Mr. Sidney Martin gave a very delightful rendering to a group of Chopin and Debussy numbers. The Mendelssohn Concerto in G-minor, in which he was accompanied on second piano by Miss Gertrude Bennie, was also a decided success, giving his full scope for his brilliant technique, clarity of tone and fine rhythmic sense.

Miss Gertrude Bennie acted as accompanist for Miss Dewey, and by her sympathetic playing added much to the program. At the close of the recital, Misses Margaret Owens, Muriel Jarry and Frances Becroft were presented with prizes and medals won for high standing at examinations.

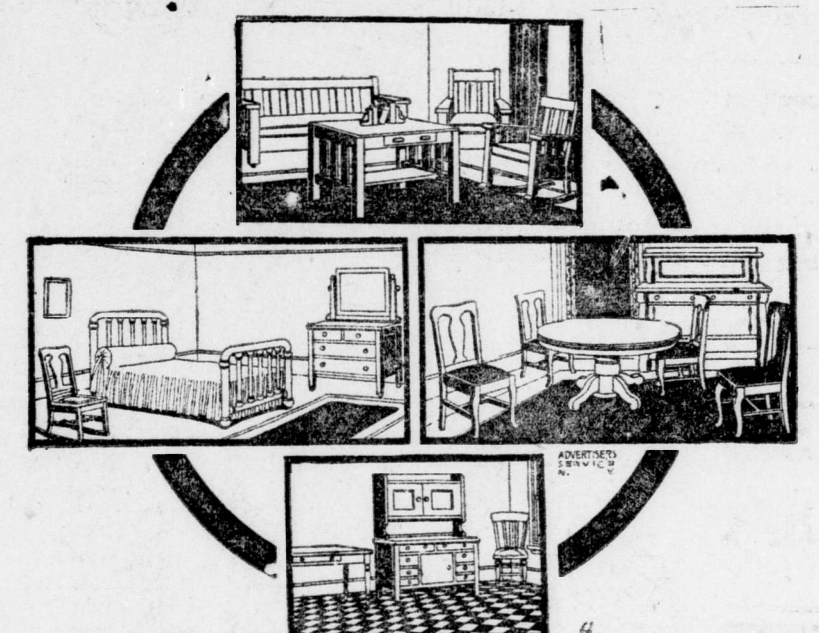

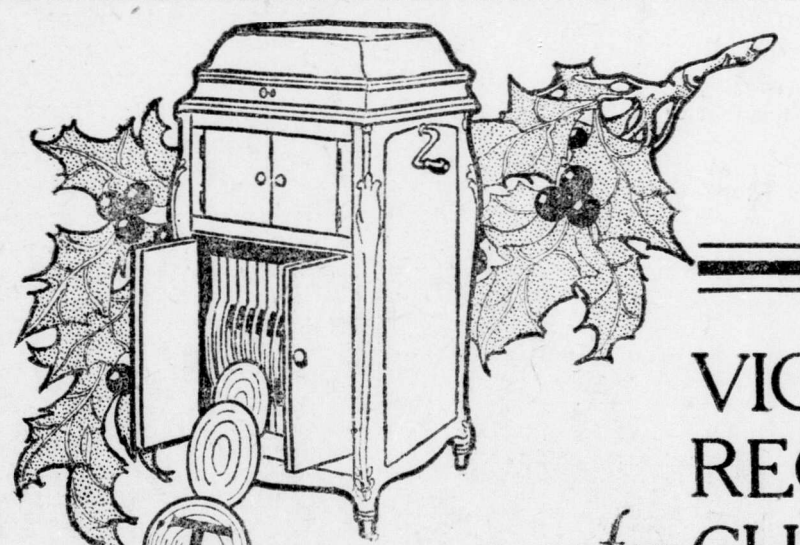
