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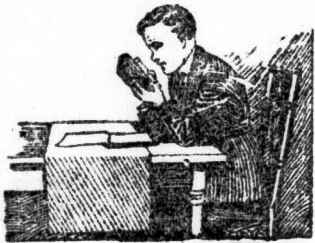

GRADUAL ELIMINATION OF ALL IMPORT DUTIES ON NECESSARIES OF LIFE IS FAVORED BY I. L. P.

Provincial Convention Votes Forty-Six To Two in Favor of Substitution of Taxation of Land Values and Luxuries To Produce Revenue.

BY forty-six to two votes, the Provincial Independent Labor party, after two and a half hours' discussion Friday night, declared itself in favor of the gradual elimination of import duties on all necessities of life such as food, clothing, boots, shoes, tools and machinery used in production, the revenue now derived from these to be raised by a taxation of land values and luxuries. one of the two minority votes, refused to accept a motion to make the vote unanimous. An amendment moved by W. S. Brunton to place the tariff question in the hands of a non-partisan board representing the farmer, workman and manufacturer was voted down.

The tariff resolution in its preamble referred to the tariff issue as one of the most important questions of today, and while observing that it was a federal issue pointed out the necessity of the provincial convention considering it, because of the fact that candidates would be placed in the federal field at the forthcoming Dominion elections.

W. S. Brunton declared it would be suicide for the Independent Labor party to side one way or the other on the tariff question, inasmuch as there were plenty of sound bread and butter questions to consider instead of being misled by the tariff issue which would be a red herring on the trail.

Mean High Taxes. Charles Brunton, who said that free trade meant a high rate of direct taxation and claimed the people of Canada had one of the highest direct taxation rates in the world.

W. S. Brunton, moving the amendment to put the question in the hands of a non-partisan board, claimed it would be a mistake for the Independent Labor party to commit itself on the question.

The resolution was seconded and supported by J. H. Fleming, but J. W. Buckley of Toronto, who followed, returned to the argument that the social amelioration of the workers' condition was of more importance.

Hamilton, N.L.P., of Hamilton, said if the Hamilton delegates had not been instructed to support a non-partisan disposition of the tariff issue, he would have supported the resolution because of the tax it proposed on land values.

Mrs. Hector Prenter, supporting the resolution, said most issues could be fairly judged by the question of taxation which classes opposed them.

James Melvina, urging the labor party not to "give away" the tariff muddle, declared that if it stood uncommitted and free, and would it stand or fall by it, it would sweep the country at the next elections.

H. Foster of Hamilton thought the land taxation question was a more urgent one than the tariff question. He would have liked to see the question of land values discussed.

Question of Principle. Arthur Wood stated that what was morally wrong could be economically right. Referring to President Rollo, who said free labor candidates could be elected in Ontario on a free trade platform, Wood declared that the aim of the party should not be merely to elect candidates, but to strive for equity and fairness to all classes.

James Simpson, who brought up some heavy fire on the tariff issue, and buried it in any direction the guns happened to be pointed, declared that it was all well and good to protect and encourage industries that could not stand alone, but that the high protection tariff was giving the country the most powerful weapons for combinations to exploit the working class. He admitted that conditions of poverty might be found in free trade countries, but attributed this to more basic economic causes. He was opposed to a tariff that would allow the manufacturers to exact more from the people than they were entitled to. For every dollar that went into the federal coffers from import duties, three dollars went in the manufacturers' pockets.

The manufacturers had the opportunity to make shoes in competition with American manufacturers, and they would have been added to the tariff. Granted the increase sought, they then suddenly raised their prices 5 per cent.

A Basis of Equity. "You can't take the issue by trying to take it out of politics," said Mr. Simpson. "We are fighting for a basis of equity in our system of protection."

Already, said Mr. Simpson, the high protection forces were getting ready their posters and campaign literature to inspire a most vicious propaganda against the United States, charging that the tariff reductions were working towards annexation.

"They will want themselves once more hypocritically in the folds of the old Union Jack," he said. "It was their policy to cloak the economic injustices under which the working classes were suffering in the shade of a spurious patriotism."

The male members of the cast are all principals, there being none in the chorus. As Isadora Moses, Jewish proprietor of the Bridge Shop, Carl George is above the average in his interpretation, and his partner, W. J. McCarthy, provides ripples of laughter with his up-to-date witticism. The scenery is elaborate in this offering.

The costumes of all the female members of the cast are exceptionally well designed, although in the lingerie parade brevity is the predominating feature. Beautiful gowns are in evidence

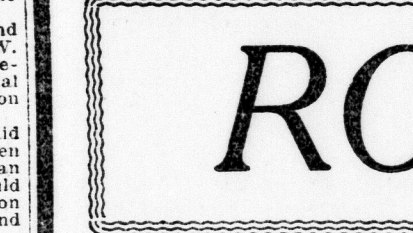
