### RIOTING IN BELFAST CAUSES HUGE DAMAGE

BELFAST, Ireland, Nov. 3.—Claims  
for damage caused in the Belfast riots  
in July and August amount to \$7,000,  
000, while the damage to the city of  
Lisburn is estimated at \$4,000,000. Lis-  
burn is a town of 12,500 population and  
owns its name chiefly to its destruction  
by fire in 1707. Its townpeople are  
taking the situation philosophically and  
remark that "when the Sinn Féiners pay  
the Government for destroyed court-

houses and barracks we will pay and  
not till then."

### STRATFORD

STRATFORD, Nov. 3.—During the  
past month the Children's Aid Society  
investigated complaints affecting 63  
children. It has been decided to hold  
the annual meeting on December 9.  
Stratford will observe Armistice  
Day, but Mayor Stevenson has not de-  
cided in just what way. A holiday  
will not be proclaimed. Likely the  
citizens will be asked to cease all  
activity for two or three minutes.

## HYDROPARLEY BRINGS NO MORE POWER AS YET

Meighen Government Refuses  
To Cut Off Export of  
Energy.

### AIRS CORRESPONDENCE

Foster Contends That Hydro  
Commission Itself Is Ex-  
porting Most.

TORONTO, Nov. 3.—Matters with re-  
gard to the negotiations between the  
Ontario Government and the Electric  
Development Company for the required  
25,000 horsepower additional power for  
the Hydro-Electric Power Commission  
were in about the same state tonight  
as they were last night.

The verbal offer of Sir William Mac-  
Kenzie, president of the Electric De-  
velopment Company, made on Tuesday  
to Premier Drury, to give relief to the  
extent of 15,000 horsepower, and sug-  
gesting that instead of linking up with  
the hydro-electric system the company  
should take over the hydro commis-  
sion's contracts to that extent, have  
been submitted in a memorandum, but  
the memorandum had not reached the  
Government tonight. It was thought  
that it might be received tomorrow.

Sir Adam Beck, chairman of the On-  
tario Hydro-Electric Power Commis-  
sion, today ridiculed Sir William Mac-  
Kenzie's claim that to link up with the  
hydro system might mean the Electric  
Development Company's plant. He  
pointed out that for years the Electric  
Development Company had deliv-  
ered power to the Ontario Power Com-  
pany, now owned by the Hydro Com-  
mission.

As to Sir William's contention that  
the most power his company could  
supply to the Hydro commission was  
15,000 horsepower, it is recalled by hy-  
dro engineers that there is on record  
a report of three judges who acted as  
a commission of inquiry that at one  
time the Electric Development Com-  
pany was exceeding its legal limit of  
125,000 horsepower by 20,000 horse-  
power or more.

### MEIGHEN GOVT. REFUSES TO CUT POWER EXPORT

OTTAWA, Nov. 3.—(By Canadian  
Press).—The Government today made  
public the correspondence with the  
Ontario Hydro-Electric Power Com-  
mission with regard to the export of  
Niagara power from Ontario.

On October 6, Sir Adam Beck wrote  
Sir George Foster, complaining that  
the Toronto Power Company would  
not renew a contract with the com-  
mission for the supply of 13,000 horse-  
power and asking that the license of  
the company to export power be can-  
celled unless this block of power, and  
a block of 18,000 horsepower presently  
under export about a contract about  
export, were both made available for  
use in Canada.

Sir George Foster sent Major  
Graham Bell, C.M.G., deputy minister  
of railways and canals, to Toronto to  
go into the matter personally with the  
Toronto Power Company and the  
hydro commission. As a result, Major  
Bell reported that the block of 13,000  
horsepower referred to by the chair-  
man of the hydro-electric commission  
was required by Power Com-  
pany for use of its own customers  
in Canada, and that the hydro-electric  
commission had been notified in 1917  
that the contract could not be re-  
newed on that basis. It was true that  
the Toronto Power Company was ex-  
porting 18,000 horsepower out of a  
total development of 125,000, but the  
hydro-electric commission itself was  
exporting 30,000 horsepower out of a  
development of 200,000.

Cancellation of Export.  
He pointed out that the cancellation  
of the power under export to the  
United States at this time would prob-  
ably bring up the question of export  
of coal from the States to Canada,  
which might lead to very serious dif-  
ficulties, and suggested instead that  
the Toronto Power Company should be  
permitted by the Ontario Govern-  
ment to again develop the 25,000 horse-  
power they were formerly developing  
until legal action on the part of the  
hydro commission was taken to restrict  
the export of power to 125,000 horse-  
power. That would, of course, be a  
matter for arrangement between the  
Provincial Government, the hydro-  
electric commission and the Toronto  
Power Company.

To these suggestions Sir Adam Beck  
replied on October 22nd that the Hydro-  
Electric Commission made no ap-  
plication to the Dominion Government  
with respect to the block of 13,000 horse-  
power. He strongly defended the ex-  
portation by the Hydro-Electric Com-  
mission of 50,000 horsepower to the  
States, claiming that it should be the  
because of the contract which was en-  
tered into before the treaty delimiting  
the waters at Niagara was signed. He  
entered into between the United States  
and Canada, and before the Electric  
Export Act was passed.

He scouted the idea that cancellation  
of the export license of the Toronto  
Power Company would result in the  
complications with respect to the im-  
portation of coal, adding further that  
the solution proposed by Major  
Graham Bell with respect to additional de-  
velopment by the Toronto Power Com-  
pany was not a solution of the question  
at all and that the Government of the  
Province of Ontario is now faced with  
means in their power to compel the  
generation and delivery of this energy.

To this Bell replied that the yester-  
day through Sir George Foster, point-  
ing out that Sir Adam's previous  
letter plainly and specifically embraced  
both blocks of power and applied for  
both on behalf of the commission and  
moreover, conveyed a wrong impres-  
sion that the Toronto Power Company  
was contemplating the export of the  
13,000 block in addition to the 18,000,  
adding:

"In support of his request for the can-  
cellation of the license to export by the  
Toronto Power Company the chairman  
of the Hydro-Electric Commission stated  
that about \$25,000 horsepower now be-  
ing generated at Niagara Falls, on both  
sides of the river, the United States,  
Canada, are by reason of the export of  
power, getting \$10,000 horsepower to  
Canada's 325,000. To prevent the ex-  
port of the 18,000 block of power, would  
somewhat reduce the disparity and to  
that extent be a relief to Canadian  
users.

Not Only Company  
"It is only fair to state that the To-  
ronto Power Company is not the only  
company exporting power to the United  
States, and this should be borne in  
mind by the Ontario public bodies  
in view of the frequent of the recurrent  
age of hydro power, are passing resolu-  
tions calling on the Government to pre-  
vent the export of power. If the Govern-  
ment accede to these requests the hydro  
Power Commission itself would be af-  
fected and the Toronto Power Com-  
pany least, as proportionately the To-  
ronto Power Company is supplying  
power to Canadian consumers than  
either the hydro or the Canadian  
Niagara Power Company."

## SEVEN COWS HAVE REAL OLD SPREE; DRUNK FOR 3 DAYS

Animals Drink Corn Mash  
Resulting From Recent  
Heavy Rains.

WINDSOR, Nov. 3.—When seven  
cows broke into the corn crib on the  
farm of Leo Desjardins, Grand Marais  
road, two weeks and consumed a con-  
siderable quantity of corn mash and  
the result was a product of a  
recent heavy rain, they got a result  
for which scores of thirsty borderlines  
on both sides of the river are paying \$10  
a bushel to secure. The bovines were  
prostrated with intoxication, and for  
three days have been laying in nearby  
field oblivious to time, food or other  
things that ordinarily occupy animal  
minds.

May Recover.  
It has been found impossible to milk  
them, but, although the animals have  
been in a state of stupor since they  
were discovered by their owner three  
days ago, it is expected they will  
recover. Efforts to rouse them, how-  
ever, have so far proved futile.

G. T. R. STATION AND  
FREIGHT SHED BURNED

NEW HAMBURG, Nov. 3.—At 1 p.  
m. today the Grand Trunk Railway pas-  
senger depot and freight house was  
discovered to be on fire, and in a short  
time was totally destroyed, together  
with the contents, which included  
freight and Canadian Express goods and  
books and papers in the office. It is  
supposed the fire was caused by elec-  
tric light wires. The local firemen  
could only confine the fire to the build-  
ing and prevent it spreading to freight  
cars on the track. This is the third  
station destroyed by fire here in 12  
years. The loss is about \$10,000.

## WINDSOR MERCHANTS INCENSED BY ORDER OF HYDRO COMMISS'N

Claim That 40,000 Additional  
Horsepower Available At  
Niagara.

WINDSOR, Nov. 3.—Claiming that  
the border merchants will be seriously  
inconvenienced and will suffer consid-  
erable financial loss, and may as well  
remain closed on Saturday evenings as  
a result of the recent edict of the local  
hydro-electric power commission pro-  
hibiting the use of power for display  
lighting, a deputation waited on  
Manager Perry of the sys-  
tem and lodged a vigorous appeal  
with that official.

In a strong resolution, copies of  
which have been sent for all the Essex  
members of the Legislature and to Sir  
Adam Beck, the Retailers' Association  
charged that facilities in the form of  
additional machinery were now avail-  
able at Niagara Falls, which, if placed  
in service, would provide 40,000 addi-  
tional horsepower for use in the province.

The deputation asked that serious  
consideration be given their request,  
and that an earnest effort be made by  
the hydro to give better service without  
resort to so drastic a measure as that  
recently inflicted on local business in-  
terests.

## ROBERTSON REPLIES TO MAYOR CHURCH

Declares His Status Was De-  
fined by the Drury  
Government.

TORONTO, Nov. 3.—"If Mayor Church  
wishes to know whom I represent, I  
would suggest that instead of writing  
to Mr. J. W. Lyon, of Guelph, he might  
ask me," was the slightly sarcastic  
comment of R. S. Robertson today on  
the Church-Lyon correspondence re-  
garding his status before the Drury  
Government was appointed by the  
Drury Government to represent the  
non-hydro municipalities, or as the of-  
ficial record of the Sutherland commis-  
sion described him for the time being  
within the proposed plan of  
radial railways, and for those who are

## EXCHANGE RATE IS REDUCING TRADING

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—(By Canadian  
Press).—Disparity of exchange rates is  
tending to reduce greatly the first post-  
bellum rush of trade between Great Brit-  
tain and the United States, according  
to Paul E. Derrick, general manager  
of the American Chamber of Commerce  
in London.  
Huge purchases by British firms in  
the United States were cancelled, Mr.  
Derrick said, when the depreciation of  
silver came about. The high cost of  
goods, through the operation of adverse  
exchange rates, he explained, made it  
impossible to market to the British  
consuming public.  
"If the United States wants to bring  
about a resumption of importing by  
Great Britain and restore exchange  
rates to normal, it is up to her to open  
her markets to British goods," Mr. Der-  
rick said.
