Coroner Hopkins further adjourned the inquest until Friday evening, Nov. 13. The coroner's jury, consisting of Messrs. G.T.R. and C.P.R. crossings gave an important evidence.

Dr. Forbes Godfrey, who conducted the post-mortem examination, stated that death was caused by some heavy impact, and could not have been caused by a fall, or the passing over his body of a wagon. Death was caused by a rupture of the liver.

Dr. Evans, associated with Dr. Godfrey, and assisting in the post-mortem, gave similar testimony. The injuries might have been caused by the buffer of the engine striking deceased.

Fred Parmenter gave unimportant evidence. A large number of witnesses who have been summoned by Constable George Simpson, are yet to be heard.
