QUADROPLETS ARE BUGS
PLOT TO PLEASE HUSBAND

o Los Angeles Woman Confess
Brood She Pretended to Bear

Are Really Counterfeits.

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 25.—On the further side of Dr. Armstrong G. Pratt's sign birth certificates for the quadruplets supposed to have been born Friday evening at the home of Mrs. W. Wilson of No. 2019 South Magnolia avenue, Dr. H. H. Ross, of the Los Angeles health department declared today that the certificates were counterfeit and made an investigation in the case.

Dr. Pratt declared that in his opinion none of the infants had been born the Wilson residence, and that all had been born in the city of Los Angeles.

He said that Mrs. Wilson confessed to him that the babies had been taken to the house by a woman who had assisted her in perpetrating the hoax.

He said that the mother of the oldest, another was a week old, he said, and the other two were about 24 hours old when he first saw them.

Mrs. Wilson, according to Dr. Pratt, not only admitted that the quadruplets were not genuine, but that two triplets, which arrived at the Wilson home in past years, which brought her a letter of recommendation and a signed photograph from President Roosevelt, were also counterfeit gifts picked up in various institutions.

Dr. Pratt said that when he questioned Mrs. Wilson she appealed to him to assist her in carrying out her desire to have the babies.

He said that Mrs. Wilson said she was an ardent desire to have children and to please her husband, who desired to have a family.

a larger family. According to story, Mrs. Wilson began the deception several months ago and carried the details so secretly and successfully as to deceive everyone with the exception of the woman who assisted

Mrs. Wilson added, the doctor said that her only genuine child was a infant born about 25 years ago. This child died in infancy. After its death, Wilson said she longed for children of her own, and at last hit upon the idea of having make-believe appearances of the stock.

PROTECTION OF EMPLOYEES

Organizer Landers Complains
Conditions in Clothing Factories

Samuel L. Landers, general organizer of the United Garment Workers of America, lodged a complaint yesterday at the public hearing of the O. C. P. before the Industrial Commission against the inadequate protection against accident in many clothing factories in the province.

Landers' complaint was based on the absence of what is known as "safety protectors" or "skirt boards" on portable lathes running high speed sewing machines. He cited the numerous instances of recent accidents in factories where these protections were missing and complained that the act relating to guarding machinery was not specific enough, and should be amended, inasmuch as it provided that "all dangerous parts of machinery

should be guarded as far as practicable." He maintained that the last words should be struck out entirely. Many manufacturers declare an expenditure for the protection of life limb of employes impracticable.

CRISIS IN INDIAN EMPIRE

Canadian Missionaries Throw Light on Anti-Foreign Uprising.

Rev. Dr. R. P. McKay, secretary of the General Assembly Foreign Missions Board, in his report to the Presbyterian synod committee on foreign missions yesterday dealt with the crisis in India.

Dr. McKay's report said that correspondence from the Canadian mission in India had been received to the effect "the new spirit of nationalism is claiming India for the natives recognizing the importance of union, which means that caste must be destroyed, for self and co-operation cannot exist to generate. This national spirit is intense anti-foreign and anti-imperialism." The report regarded the situation as serious.

The people of India are be-

ered. They do not know where to turn. In their bewilderment they are trying to rehabilitate their old religious ideas. They open public halls, organize societies to propagate their own views, but specially to denounce Christianity. It is the last struggle of the old religions of India to save themselves from oblivion. India is thus in the midst of a death struggle between light and darkness."
