POISON INTENDED FOR EXTERNAL USE

(Continued From Page 1). sulphate meant sulphurette because of the directions, "use as directed," which he took to mean externally. The original prescription and the copy

made by Caswell were produced last night and plainly read barium sulphate. Caswell, in defence, argued over the chirography and stated that barium sulphate was not known to a great many Toronto druggists. He had learned at college that barium salts were never taken internally and was advised never to label any prescriptions as poisonous until ordered by a medical practitioner.

He had never had many prescriptions with "use as directed" on them, but generally they expressed whether for external or internal use. He had filled one prescription for barium sulphurette in the last year.

Dr. Pollock's Statement.

On learning of the woman's death Dr. M. A. Pollock said he immediately had a copy made by the druggist of his prescription which satisfied him that he (Dr. Pollock) had specified barium sulphate.

He explained that he had prescribed barium sulphate for Mrs. Resnick following a diagnosis and that he was going to take an X-ray of the digestional tract the day of her death. No picture could be taken unless the salts were present in the stomach to form an outline so that the digestion could be watched. He had filled the prescription which read, "barium sul-phate, chemically pure, oz. 2," and had secured some of the powder she had taken, which was presented last night as an exhibit of barium sulphurette along with the bottle from which Caswell had taken the salt. Barium sulphate was a white, harmless powder while barium sulphurette gave off an odor and was yellowish in

It was established that, where a doctor had his own X-ray outfit, it was customary and considered good practice to allow the patient to take the prescription and that "use as directed" was an order in general use among all medical practitioners. As long as the salt was chemically pure, ro harm could result from taking any quantity of it.

This was corroborated by Dr. H. B. Anderson, consulting physician, who said he thought druggists should know that barium sulphurette was an irritant poison usually prescribed the form of a paste, and by Dr 3 L. J. Breslin, J. Solway and Dr. Adams, who first attended Mrs. Resnick.

Dr. Walter Campbell of the General Hospital staff gave her antidotes and said that nothing could probably have been done by any of the doctors to save her life. He thought that bar'um sulphate for X-ray purposes should be labelled to prevent carelessness.

Detective Thomson stated that Caswell had been eager to do everything possible and had given him the bottle of barium sulphurette from which the fatal salt had been taken.
