**COLORED INSTITUTE SUFFERS FROM TIMES**

**War Has Seriously Affected the School and Washington Calls for Northern Help.**

"The most trying and difficult experience that which the south has been called on to pass since the civil war," according to Dr. Booker T. Washington in his annual report of the Tuskegee Institute, "have made the last year exceptionally hard for the school, and promise a harder year to come. The budget for the ensuing year is placed at \$29,567, and, although the endowment has grown to almost \$2,000,000, \$108,067 of this must be raised from outside sources."

With the report is published a statement by Seth Low, chairman of the board of trustees, estimating that the annual difference between the expenses of the institute and its assured income is likely to be \$100,000, and urging that some steps be taken to relieve Dr. Washington of the heavy burden of providing for this deficit.

"I would call attention," says Dr. Washington, "to the fact that next year will be the end of a five-year period for which a number of trustees and friends made a definite promise to give a certain sum of money each year. We shall have to begin now to consider some method of replacing these donations. The relief which has come to us because of this guarantee fund has been most marked and far-reaching. This means that our present endowment ought to be increased greatly or a larger income assured by some other source."

"Conditions due to the low price of cotton resulting from the European war have been very serious among both white and black people. Because of these conditions, this institute has been doing an unusual amount of work and expending an unusual amount of money in trying to teach these people how to overcome them by planting something to eat."

**YOUR TAG READY**  
**ONE OF 350,000**

**Captains of Three Thousand**  
**"Recruiting Day" Workers Armed**

**KEEP TORONTO AHEAD**

Recruiting Day tags to the number of 250,000 were Saturday supplied to the captains who will take part in the big campaign of the Citizens' Recruiting League on Tuesday next, Khaki Day and Memorial Day for the late King Edward VII. Almost three thousand Toronto women and girls are assisting in the effort to "Keep Toronto Ahead" in her place as foremost recruiting centre of the Dominion, and the organizer, Mrs. G. R. Baker, has mapped out the plan of campaign in a military manner as possible.

For Tag Day Toronto has been divided into 42 districts, with a captain over each. Under each captain are five lieutenants, and each lieutenant is in charge of one automobile and ten privates, who go out to the firing line laden with ammunition trays and money boxes.

"Keep Toronto Ahead" over-seas battalions are helping the recruiting and recruiting depot, who must carry on at home, and will be here on Tuesday to help. They are providing four teams and at least fifty officers will be among the workers.

Sirens which make Toronto's streets have been provided for the backs of the cars, and large shields, replicas of the little tags will decorate the cars.

The men's teams, under Mr. F. E. Fetherstonhaugh, will meet early on Monday morning before the Royal Bank on King street, and will spend the day canvassing the business portions of the city.

"We're giving the men who can't go a chance to do their share," said one of them today.

The downtown part of the city has been divided into sections, each team of men taking so many blocks instead of just canvassing so many addresses, as was done formerly. When the day's work is over they will report at the bank, and on Tuesday at 5 o'clock they will report at headquarters, the city hall, when all the captains and ladies' tagging teams bring their boxes in.

Forty Tanners to Count Money.

City banks have provided forty tellers who will commence operations at 5 and expect to have all returns in and checked by 8 o'clock on Tuesday. The Empire Club patriotic demonstration in Massey Hall.

Meetings of the captains with their workers were held Saturday afternoon, when the boxes were distributed and final instructions given. Two captains whose names did not appear on the first list published are Mrs. G. Reynolds and Mrs. C. A. Simmons.

While the route of the big parade has not been finally decided upon, it is tentatively given as starting from Exhibition camp, going north on Dufferin to King, to Jarvis, to Wellesley, to St. Albert's and to Queen's Park, down the east side to front of the Parliament buildings, down University avenue to Queen and west on Queen to Dufferin to the camp. The 9th Battalion, newly formed, under Lieut. Col. R. K. Barker, will also march and the estimated parade strength is ten thousand.

**WANTS SPECIAL TAX ON UNMARRIED MEN**

**Ald. John H. Hodgson of Hamilton to Bring Up Proposal Monday.**

**FIFTY CENTS WEEKLY**

HAMILTON, Sunday, Nov. 7.—Ald. H. Hodgson said today that he has no intention of abandoning his scheme of a general tax on unmarried men. Stress of business has prevented him giving it adequate attention, but on Monday he intends taking steps to bring the suggestion to a head, a special meeting of the council being probable.

"Since I made the suggestion a number of young men have told me that they think it is just what is needed. Various manufacturers have also informed me that they will line up their men in the suggestion," said he Saturday.

Ald. Hodgson's scheme calls for a special tax of \$25 yearly, or 50 cents a week. Every single man, he says, can afford to give this much. Single men, he says, are contributing very little towards the general expenses of the war, but Ald. Hodgson's suggestion would compel them to help. He plans to have it taken up through the Dominion.

**WILL FLY FROM TORONTO TO N. Y.**

**Victor Carlstrom to Attempt Unusually Long Flight Alone**

**DISTANCE 360 MILES**

**If Successful, Trip Will Top American Record by 200 Miles.**

Flying alone in an 80-hp. in an hour machine, Victor Carlstrom will early this week try to fly from Toronto to New York. The straightaway distance is over 360 miles, or a little farther than from the allied trenches in France to Berlin. He will take advantage of the first fine day.

Carlstrom is one of the instructors at the Curtiss School at Long Branch, and the machine he will use is an R2, a type supplied in big quantities to the two British air services, and made in Canada, except for the engine. The aeroplane has a spread of 40 feet and 170 horsepower, and especially equipped for long distance work. He will carry 15 gallons of gasoline, enough for eight hours, and will land at Governor's Island. If successful in getting to New York it is not likely that he will essay the flight back.

"The flight," said J. A. P. McCurdy, of the Curtiss Company, "will be made to fully satisfy ourselves that this type of machine is capable of this extraordinary effort. As a duration non-stop across country trip it will top all the records made on this continent. The best duration flight, and also the record distance flight made on this side of the Atlantic was that of W. C. Robinson, who flew from St. Louis, Mo., to Kentland, Ind., on October 17, 1911. He covered 332 miles without a stop."

**SOME OF STRIKERS RETURN TO WORK**

**Hydro-Electric Employees Believed to Be Wavering in Stand**

**NO REPLY YET MADE**

**Manager Couzens Has Not Answered Affidavit of Union Men.**

Information given out at the offices of the Toronto Hydro-Electric system Saturday was to the effect that some of the strikers have returned to their jobs and the officials believe that the men are wavering. Many of the men have refused to strike.

No reply has been made by General Manager Couzens to the affidavits, in which he is said to have expressed surprise that men whose jobs he saved for them joined the strikers.

The system is being operated satisfactorily, and no complaints have been received so far.

Speaking in regard to the situation, F. W. Ellis, chairman of the commission, stated Saturday that there was no need for a strike at the present time, as the wages were not affected until next May.

**BRITISH TRADE RETURNS SHOW BIG INCREASES**

**Imports in October Jumped Eighty-Two Million Dollars—Exports Also Greater.**

LONDON, Nov. 6.—The board of trade figures for October show an increase in imports of £2,413,000 (\$2,065,000). Exports increased £3,387,000 (\$16,335,000). The principal increases in imports were: Food, £3,000,000; chemicals and drugs, £1,000,000; raw materials, £8,000,000, of which cotton from America contributed £3,000,000. The principal increases in exports were in iron steel and textile manufactures.

**SUB BLOCKADE OF ENGLAND DROPPED**

**Germans Will Use Remaining Ships in Mediterranean**

**SINK SEVERAL SHIPS**

**British Methods of Defeating Submarines Too Effective.**

PARIS, Nov. 6, 12.30 p.m.—The Straits of Gibraltar have again been passed by German submarines, which on Thursday sank two French and one Italian steamships. The crew of one vessel is missing.

The following statement was made by the marine ministry today:

"The enemy's submarines, coming from the Atlantic, passed through the Straits of Gibraltar on the night of Nov. 2. They sunk on Nov. 4 the French ship Dahra, off Arzew, Algeria, and the French ship Calvados and the Italian ship Isonzo, near Cape Ivi.

"The crews of the Dahra and Isonzo were saved. There is no news from the crew of the Calvados."

The sinking of the Isonzo was reported from London last night. The Dahra, 2127 tons gross, sailed from Port Talbot, Wales, on Oct. 7 for Tunis. The Calvados is not mentioned in maritime records.

German submarines have penetrated the Straits of Gibraltar previously during the war. This was first accomplished successfully when Captain Herring made his now famous trip with the U-51 from Germany to the Dardanelles last spring. In September a number of merchantmen and transports were sunk in the Mediterranean by submarines, but recently little has been heard of their activities.

News of the presence of a number of German submarines in the Mediterranean bears out information received from a private source in France to the effect that Germany had decided to send most of her submarines to the Mediterranean, having virtually abandoned her campaign in British waters in consequence of the engagements she had entered into with the United States.

This disclosure is said to have been made in the form of an announcement by the German minister at Bucharest, Roumania.

In England, however, the suggestion has been advanced that Germany's abandonment of her submarine campaign in English waters was due to the effective measures adopted by the British and the large number of German submarines reported to have been destroyed. Activities of submarines in the Mediterranean, according to the navy, are designed to divert attention from the ending of the campaign near the British Isles, as well as to impress the Balkan States.

ALGIERS, Nov. 6, via Paris.—The steamship Sidi Ferruch was sunk yesterday forty miles off this port by a German submarine. The steamer's crew of 28 men arrived today at Algiers. The Sidi Ferruch carried no passengers.
