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"THE WAR IS ALL BUT WON" SAYS FIRST LORD JELLCOE

Admiral Adds We Have Now But "To Set
Our Teeth"—Carson and Smuts Express
Britain's Determination

London, Oct. 25.—Great Britain's de-
termination to fight on until German
militarism is crushed was emphasized
yesterday by Sir Edward Carson, head
of the war aims committee at Port-
smouth, and by Lieutenant-General
Smuts, privy councillor, at Sheffield,
where they addressed meetings under
the auspices of the war aims committee.
Sir Edward said the war had been
declared "whether we are going to
prove superior in sticking power to the
Germans and our other enemies." He
added that Great Britain could not and
would not make peace without con-
currence and consent of her dominions.
Neither would Great Britain enter into
peace negotiations behind the backs of
her allies.

GREAT WORK OF BRITISH AIR FIGHTERS

Review Made By Major-Gen-
eral Maurice
Germans Far Out-Stripped

During September 274 German
Aircraft Brought Down—Ef-
fective Answer to Enemy Stories
of Dissection Between British
and French

London, Oct. 25.—To the Associated
Press yesterday Major-General Maurice,
chief director of military operations at
the war office, said:
"It is no discredit to the British air-
force that it did not bring down a
single Zeppelin while the French air-
men brought down five in the course of
the Zeppelin raid a few days ago. No
French airman would think of compar-
ing the task which they had of attack-
ing the Zeppelins in broad daylight
when the airships were in the hands of
long flight, and a greatly reduced, with
that of the British airman in finding and
attacking them in the night while the
invasors were still fresh.

GARFIELD SHUTS OFF COAL FOR HOARDERS

Cleveland Firms With Huge Sup-
ply Are Refused Further
Shipments

Sees Prices Coming Down—Reduced
10 to 40 Cents a Ton in New York,
He Says—Western Miners Return-
ing to Work

Washington, Oct. 22.—With the crisis
in the coal situation, caused by the
disputes and reduced production, appar-
ently behind him, Dr. H. A. Garfield,
the fuel administrator, considered drastic
action today to restrict further ship-
ments to hoarders and to curtail, and if
necessary, eliminate, delivery of large
consignments to manufacturers of non-
war-time commodities.

DOOR IS OPENED FOR MARGARINE

Manufacture And Sale And Free
Importation After Nov. 14—
The Milk Situation

Ottawa, Oct. 25.—An order-in-council
has been passed, upon the recommenda-
tion of the food controller, allowing, on
and after November 14, the manufacture
and sale of oleomargarine in Canada and
its importation free of duty. Suspension
of the prohibition of its manufacture,
import or sale is a war measure only
and will apply while the present abnor-
mal conditions continue. The conclu-
sion of such condition will be deter-
mined by the governor-general-in-council.
Persons wishing to manufacture or
import oleomargarine must first obtain
a license from the food controller.

New British Plan In Dealing With Capital and Labor

London, Oct. 25.—Concurrently with an
unofficial announcement last night that
employers would form a great combina-
tion to protect the interest of capital,
and in an endeavor to adjust the rela-
tions between employers and employees,
the government issued a statement to
the effect that it adopted as part of its
policy of industrial reconstruction the
recommendations of a special committee
which reported in last June.

The committee advised the es-
tablishment of industrial councils rep-
resenting the trade unions and employers'
associations in each industry.

STORM VERY SEVERE IN QUEBEC REGION

day morning destroyed the farm prop-
erty of Stewart Gibson, formerly of
