Mayor Holds Receipts.
Evansville, Ind., Oct. 21.—Mayor Basse today was holding the box office receipts of a wrestling match held here last night, in which Joseph Stecher, Dodge, Neb., defended "his title of world's heavy-weight champion" against "Strangler" Ed Lewis, Lexington, Ky.

Contending that the promoters did not live up to their guarantee of a fair match, the mayor says a settlement will be offered the wrestlers and promoters by which two-thirds of the proceeds will be given to local charities. The match ended in a decision for Stecher, when Lewis fell through the ropes and said he had been injured.

"We wouldn't object to getting the services of Baker," said the captain, "but as for letting Maisel go, why, we wouldn't lost him for both Baker and Gardner."

Braves May Team at Miami.
A report from Boston is that the Braves will desert Macon as a training camp. President Gaffney has, it is said, signed a five-year contract with Miami, Fla., representatives to pitch his team in that resort. The Dodgers will return to Daytona, provided certain improvements are made in the ball park, and the Phillies can't well refuse to return to St. Petersburg, after their record of this year. The Cubs doubtless will be at Tampa again, and the Athletics at Jacksonville. It looks like a big spring for Florida.

New York, Oct. 23.—That right hand blow on the jaw that Frank Moran gave to Jim Coffey at Madison Square Garden on Tuesday night has started the Pittsburgh boxer on the road to "easy street". Moran has never been a money maker, despite the fact that he has fought champions and the best heavyweights in the country. He was practically "broken" when he entered the ring.

For his seven minutes and a half of work against Coffey, Moran received \$8,400 and an offer by telegram for an engagement in Boston. He said that he had offered for fifteen other weeks for a similar sum, but accepted only the Boston engagement, as he thought he would be busy trying to obtain a match with Jess Willard.
