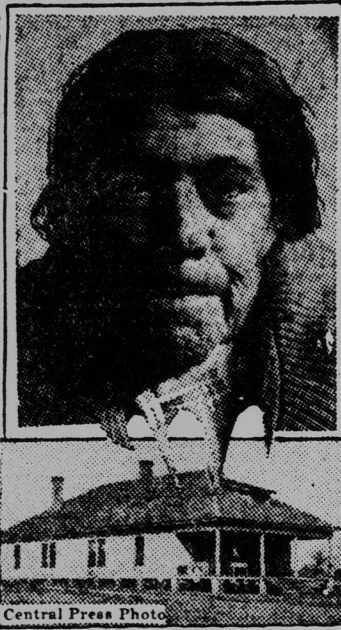
Applications plenty.

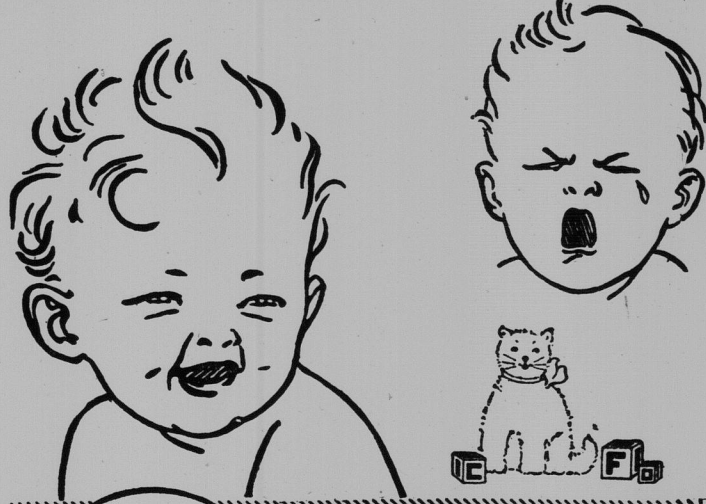
