The executive of the Labrador Mission met yesterday at the home of Mrs. G. K. McLeod to make arrangements for the annual meeting next month. Reports were read from a recent tea and sale. The sum of \$500 was sent to the headquarters of the society recently.

**CHOPS HUSBAND TO DEATH**  
Delaware Women Attacks Him While He Sleeps, Fearing for Life.  
Wilmington, Del., Jan. 19.—Made desperate, she told the police because he had threatened to kill her, Mrs. Robert Liggins, 38 years old, killed her husband with an axe while he lay asleep on a couch.  
According to a confession which the police say Mrs. Liggins made to them, her husband started a quarrel because supper was not ready. The quarrel continued until midnight when Liggins lay down on the couch. Mrs. Liggins continued to chop and pound him until she was satisfied he was dead.

**SAID CELLAR WAS ROBBED.**  
Port Arthur Man Fined for Selling When he Complained.  
Port Arthur, Ont., Jan. 19.—Peter McNab, Port William, reported to the police that thirty-seven cases of liquor had been stolen from his cellar. Police investigated, and Saturday McNab appeared before Magistrate Palling on a charge of keeping liquor for sale. The magistrate found him guilty and fined him \$200, saying he did not believe the story of theft, but was rather inclined to believe it had been given to the police to cover up disposal of stock in another manner. There had been a lot of that kind of thing going on, he said.

Port William, Ont., Jan. 19.—Three timber wolves invaded Port Arthur yesterday and were observed by children going to Sunday school. Nearly two hundred pelts have been brought to the city for Government bounty since snow fell this winter.
