POWER COMPANY AND EMPLOYEES

Statements from Both Sides
of Controversy in Which
Strike is Threatened.

Unless an amicable adjustment of differences is made between the officials of the New Brunswick Power Company and the employees, by 6 o'clock this evening, a strike of all workers in the gas house, power house, street railway service and other branches of the company will be called immediately, affecting all the car lines, the lights, electric power and gas supply of the city, according to a statement given out by the officials of the employees' union last night. A meeting of the executive of the company will be held this afternoon at 4 o'clock, when this matter will be considered.

The company's statement. In connection with a Telegram report last night, Thomas H. McCauley, general manager of the New Brunswick Power Company, said that up to the present time the only notice that the company has ever received of the threatened strike action is what has appeared in the columns of the press. The company now, as at all times, is ready to do its part toward insuring both the public and its employees a square deal in the adjustment of any misunderstanding which may arise in the conduct of its service, and believing that it has been most liberal in the matter of the present adjustment in wages, it is unthinkable that any body of men will take the drastic action which is now threatened with the resulting disastrous inconvenience to the public.

The company was given to understand that the cause in dispute, i.e., "This agreement shall not prevent the company from operating a one-man car but the agreement shall terminate upon the introduction of such car into regular use" was drawn by the representative of the employees, who was notified that its insertion in the agreement was satisfactory to the company, and as stated above, the only intimation that it has since received that the employees have changed their position with regard to its insertion, is what has appeared in the press.

Furthermore the company is willing

to resort to arbitration, if necessary, and to abide by the outcome of such arbitration, and it therefore desires to emphasize the fact that if a strike should now result, the entire responsibility will rest on the heads of the employees and not on the company.

The Men's Statement. The following statement was given out last night by Fred A. Campbell and other officials of the local branch of the Amalgamated Association of Street and Electric Employees:

"The New Brunswick Power Company employees feel that they owe it to the public to state as clearly and concisely as possible their stand in regard to the trouble they are having with Mr. McCauley, the company's manager."

"It has been customary in the past to sign an agreement each year when a new wage schedule and working conditions are required, and since June 15 the men have endeavored to reach an amicable settlement. So patient were they that it was not until quite recently that Mr. McCauley, acting for the directorate, handed an agreement to the organization and asked that it be submitted forthwith. This was done and the men assented to it. Like a man who makes a part payment to bind a contract to a sale of property, General Manager McCauley signed an interim contract, the spirit of which interim agreement was subsequently carried out in full by the agreement handed to the men for consideration. Then the lid was off and Mr. McCauley appeared to find that legally his so-called one-man car had been attached.

He backed up in the breach and a further meeting was held later with Mr. Taylor. A paragraph was prepared which was then submitted to the men (not as Mr. McCauley published it), but the employees felt that as Mr. McCauley was going to try out the car and as the section called for the termination of the contract, they might just as well face the music now.

"They considered also that the so-called one-man car is the old car made over—a real death trap—and because of its mechanism, if the innocent public would take a chance, they would not. In place of the safety appliances the old hand-brake is to be used. What if it failed on a hill? Now we have two brakes, one for the motorman, one in the rear for the conductor. "We regret that the public might be inconvenienced, but mark well, we could have gotten anything to sell them out. We refused to be used. A representative of the company suggested that we recommend a ten cent fare and also have a recommendation for street working men. In other words, take in our friends and help soak the public. Had we agreed to do so and the public stood for it, how much longer would you have heard about this so-called one-man car? Look under the curtain and see who are playing a nice game for big stakes."

"The men still are ready to sign the original agreement and also when the Birney Safety One-man car they will willingly operate it. Halifax has these cars and surely this company should be compelled to produce a safe and as good a car for St. John as Halifax has."

"Mr. McCauley says that the Birney car would not be satisfactory in St. John—the car that is recommended by the United States government—and in the name of common sense does he think that he can gull the public into believing that the old hand-brake is a safety device by him into a one-man car superior to the Birney safety?"

IRISH AFFAIRS

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

Belfast, July 11.—Numerous outrages occurred in and around Cork today. Sergeant Seery is dying in the Cork military hospital from several bullet wounds received in an attack upon him while he was carrying the police mail to the Green post office near Cork. His assailant seized the mail and decamped.

The sergeant in charge of the Rathmore, Cork, barracks, was killed by a bomb and two constables were wounded while defending the barracks from an attack. Three abandoned police barracks in Cork city were burned today.

Another police party returning from the post office to the barracks at Dunlop, on the Douglas seaboard, with police mail, was attacked. Sergeant Mooney's head and body were riddled with small shot, but with the aid of his comrades, he succeeded in reaching the barracks.

Seven justices of the peace in Cavan county jointly tendered their resignations to the Lord Chancellor. In their letter they said:

"We no longer wish to be associated with an executive whose actions are subversive of justice and equity and who suggest to the feelings of a vast majority of our fellow-countrymen."

In Belfast today quiet prevailed. The military gave permission to the Derry Orangemen to carry out a foundation stone ceremony near the city. Previously the stone-laying had been prohibited in the fear of a demonstration.

A detail of troops occupied the city hall last night for protective purposes. Troops also were stationed in the former layman on the Grosvenor road, while the castle yards also were garrisoned. No disorders were reported.

17,600 POUND PACKAGE
TO BE SENT BY MAIL.
New York, July 12.—Paul W. Bartlett, well known sculptor, has made arrangements with the United States and French postal departments whereby the four bas reliefs of the Knights of Columbus statue of the Virgin, which will be presented to France in August, will go by mail. The bas reliefs are made of Tennessee marble, each weighing 4,400 pounds. The reliefs show President Wilson, General Pershing, Marshal Foch and Columbus. The statue already is completed and the reliefs will be fixed to the pedestal in Metz.

Island of Rats.

London, July 12.—The rat plague on Foulness Island, off the coast of Essex, has reached enormous proportions. Last year a relief ship loaded with grain and other foodstuffs stranded, and a great deal of rat nourishment caused the rats to multiply to such a degree that during the last winter the island was alive with the pests.

Paris, July 12.—Pan-shaped collars are the fashion in Paris for evenings. The hair is drawn back loosely from the forehead and waved in a large knot just above the nape of the neck. From the knot there stands up a wide high fan-like wave of hair supported by invisible combs, which often reaches six inches in height. The general effect is striking.

POLICE CHIEF AYERS GIVES HIS TESTIMONY
