Japan Ready ToGoToWar?

Anxiety In Paris Over Attitude Toward China In Peace Conference

Washington, Feb. 11—(By the Associated Press) — Japan's attitude toward China in the peace conference is causing grave apprehension among the representatives of the other associated powers. According to official diplomatic information reaching here, Japan virtually has threatened war if China makes public secret treaties between the two countries and fails to carry out an agreement to make Japan the successor of Germany in rights, property and concessions held by Germany at the outbreak of the European war.

China is relying on the peace conference, where her delegates are said to have made an excellent impression, and is seking support from the United States and Great Britain.


The German national assembly at Weimer has adopted the provisional constitution with little amendment. The national president will be elected today. Fifty-four radicals, alien born anarchists, Industrial Workers of the World and others, arrived at Hoboken, yesterday from the west, for peportation, They cheered the Bolsheviki and the I. W. W.

Thirty-five of the women arrested for burning President Wilson in effigy in Washington were tried yesterday. Twenty-five were sentenced to five days in jail, one to two days and the cases against the others dismissed. The women announced that they would conduct a "hunger strike."

ARRESTS IN LAWRENCE.
Lawrence, Mass., Feb. II—Alleged attempts to jostle mill workers passing through the zone picketed by strikers near the Arlington mills caused six arrests on intimidation charges here early today. The police reported no disturbances about the other mills, while leaders in the strike for forty-eight hours with fifty-four hours' pay asserted there was no increase in the number who returned to work either yesterday or today. Mill officials, however, said more men were at work than at any/time since the strike started a week ago.
