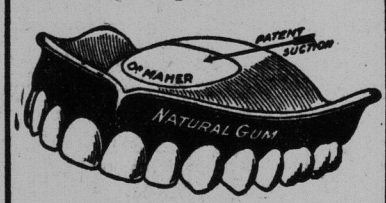

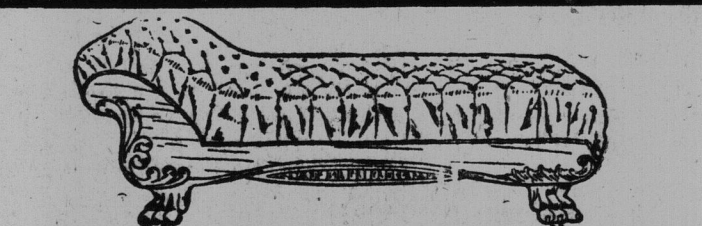

RECENT DEATHS

Timothy Collins.
Timothy Collins, chairman of the board of health, a prominent citizen and for many years a successful business man, died last night at his home, 20 Richmond street. Mr. Collins' illness had been troubling him for some time but it was not until recently that it became acute. He went to Montreal to get expert advice and treatment but relief was only temporary. During the last few weeks he had been confined to his bed. Yesterday his condition seemed very favorable but early last evening he suffered a relapse and passed away quickly.
The death of Mr. Collins will be sincerely regretted by the entire community and his passing will be a distinct loss to the business life of the city. Though advancing in years, his interest in civic affairs and matters of public concern generally, never waned. He took a lively part in politics for many years. He was an ardent Liberal until the last general election when he gave his support to the Unionist cause and became chairman of the Unionist organization in Wellington ward. As chairman of the board of health he acted carefully and conscientiously and he accomplished

much. Members of the board speak highly of his energy and perseverance to attain improved sanitation and better health conditions.
As a business man he attained marked success. In early life he became engaged in the wholesale grocery business, and for the last thirty-two years he had done business at his well known stand in Market street. His devotion to business and his sound methods of conducting his affairs carried him along on the road to success. He built up a splendid trade and accumulated considerable means.
In a social way he was also very active. In recent years he was an ardent member of Council 987, Knights of Columbus, and he was chiefly instrumental in securing the splendid home which the local council now has in Coburg street. He was a member of the fourth degree and was vice-president of the property company. Prior to his activity in the Knights of Columbus he gave considerable attention to the C. M. B. He assisted in organizing the Y. M. C. I. when that institution was

thrown open and was on the finance committee. He was a past president of the Father Matthew Association and was also associated with the New Brunswick Temperance Union.

Mr. Collins was born in the old country and came here with his parents when he was six weeks old. He is survived by his wife and one son, Francis, of this city.
