Pelky Knocked Out.
San Francisco, Cal., Jan. 1.—Gumbat Smith, the California heavyweight, scored a decisive victory today when he knocked out Arthur Pelky, the much-

heralded Canadian fighter, in the fifteenth round of the white hope championship battle in the Daly City Open-Air Arena. The sailor was a strong favorite in the betting at odds of 7 to 10.

After thirty seconds' fighting in the fifteenth round Smith feinted with his left, then swung his right with lightning-like rapidity. The blow landed with a crash on Pelky's unprotected jaw. Pelky dropped with his eyes glassy. Mechanically he struggled to his feet at the

count of nine, and unsteadily assumed his fighting pose. A left and right applied similarly toppled him on his back, and he was out when Referee Griffin awarded the fight to Smith.

The Federals.
