BOSTON OPERA ARTISTS CHARM

Treat in Music in Opera House—Singers in Enchanting Programme

Seldom has it been the privilege of music lovers of this city to hear a more thoroughly enjoyable programme than that of the Boston Opera Company's stars in the Opera House last evening. Madame Evelyn Scottney, Madame Clara Sagap, Alfredo Ramella and Howard White form a group of artists whose singing was a rare treat and the accompaniments by Maestro John Craig Kelly gave the finishing touches to an evening which will be long remembered by those whose good fortune it was to be present.

The only cause for regret was the small size of the audience. St. John has hopes of being recognized as a musical city, but unless better support is given when opportunity to hear such music is provided it can hardly be expected that the opportunities will be repeated. The second concert will be held this evening and should attract a crowded house. Since her last appearance here, when she made a remarkable impression, Madame Scottney has proved herself to be one of the leading sopranos of the world and is hailed in some quarters as the successor to the great Patti. The improvement, both in her voice and her technique were noticeable last night and her singing won the enthusiastic plaudits of the audience. Her voice is one of the rarest of full volume, clear and sweet and in the higher register is of a flute-like quality. The only drawback is a slightly nasal tone at times. She was heard first in Myerbeer's Shadow Song. This proved an artistic triumph and she was forced to respond with an encore and her original presentation of the old favorite "Coming Thro' the Rye" won her another ovation. In her group of songs "The Spirit Flower," "Down in the Forest" and "The Fairy Piper," Madame Scottney repeated her previous successes and again was generous in her response to the demands for more.

Madame Sagap was new to St. John audiences, but soon won the hearts of her hearers with her rich contralto voice of exceptional quality. The "City of Rachel," her opening number, was given with great effect and quickly revealed the possibilities of her beautiful voice although it took some of her later selections to bring out the richness of her lower notes. Her group of three songs, with the encore which was insisted on, proved extremely popular.

Howard White was greeted as an old favorite and renewed the excellent impression which he has made on other visits. His voice, of unusual clearness, is mellow and resonant and every nuance of his response to the demands for more.

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
