### Good Work Has Been Done By The Australian Fleet

London, Sept. 16—A despatch to the Times from Sydney, dated Tuesday, says that Rear Admiral Sir George Patey, commander of the Australian fleet reports that the German losses at Herbertshohe in the Bismarck Archipelage were twenty to thirty killed and seventeen German officers and non-commissional officers.

The Australian fleet left Sydney immediately following the outbreak of the war, according to the despatch and co-operated with the China squadron.
