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BRITISH PARLIAMENT
London, Feb. 14—The opening day of the parliamentary session, which is to deal with Home Rule, Welsh disestablishment, and electoral reform, was marked by a statement by Premier Asquith that the visit of Viscount Halifax, secretary for war, to Berlin, was made at the invitation of Germany and that the conversations between the British war minister and the German authorities had reference to a desire on the part of both countries that the existing tension should be relieved.
It is evident that Andrew Bonar Law and Lord Lansdowne, leaders of the opposition respectively in the house of commons and the house of lords, had been informed of the course of the discussion, for although they spoke before the premier, Lord Lansdowne assured the government of Unionist support in any move to secure a better understanding with Germany.
The speeches on domestic affairs dealt only generally with the government's huge legislative programme. Bonar Law, in his fighting speech, promised to offer stubborn resistance to Home Rule and other measures.
Lord Lansdowne intimated that Home Rule will meet its fate in the house of lords. It will therefore have to be passed by the house of commons, as provided by the parliament bill.
Premier Asquith, who deferred to the overclouding of Anglo-German relations as "a most lamentable fact," took occasion to deny the story that the British fleet last autumn was preparing for an aggressive attack on Germany.

I. L. & B. ASSEMBLY.
The members of the I. L. & B. held a very enjoyable assembly in the O'Regan assembly room last evening. There was a fairly large attendance, and an entertaining programme of dances was carried out. The year book does not give statistics regarding live stock during the last two years of the Liberal regime, but there has been no wonderful development except in the case of swine.
The following figures regarding the number of live stock is taken from the census returns of 1901, the report of the Agricultural Commission for 1908, and the returns made by the government for the years 1909 and 1910:

On the other hand, the production of wheat fell off from 410,714 bushels in 1907 to 290,848 in 1910, and back-wheat from 1,451,191 in 1907 to 1,280,717 in 1910. The production of oats shows little variation, being 5,748,194 bushels in 1907, against 5,822,338 in 1909 and 5,847,877 in 1910.
In view of the fact that since 1907 Canada as a whole has enjoyed an unprecedented era of progress, there is practically nothing in these statistics to warrant the claim that the local government by its much vaunted agricultural policy has done anything of importance to promote agriculture in the province. If the farmers have improved their position, it has been because of high prices—that is, largely at the expense of the people living in towns and cities.

NEWFOUNDLAND LEGISLATURE
St. John's, Nfld., Feb. 14.—Plans for the coming year announced by Governor Ralph Champney Williams in the speech from the throne at the opening of the legislature today include the improvement of the fisheries, the extension of roads, additional coastal steamers, a better telephone, telegraph and wireless facilities, and a general scheme to combat tuberculosis through the agency of the Red Cross, which are recent gifts. He also forecast the extension of the old age pension system by making school teachers eligible as pensioners.
Governor Williams declared the prosperity of the colony to be unexampled, this welcome condition, he said, is due to the good fisheries, the high prices secured for export goods, and the exceptional progress that has been made in farming, mining and manufacturing industries.
Henry F. Ashurst, who has just been chosen by popular vote as a United States senator from Arizona, left home at five years old, has been cowboy, hod carrier, deputy sheriff, lumberjack, law student and legislator.

LOOKS LIKE TROUBLE FOR GOVERNMENT
Nationalists Taking a Decided Stand on the School Question—Sir Wilfrid Had Best Legal Advice

Ottawa, Feb. 14.—The difficulties of the government with their Nationalist-Conservative supporters from Quebec over the Manitoba school question, and the repeal of the naval law, reached an acute stage late tonight. The Quebec ministers were in caucus for two hours, every member being present, with not one in the commons chamber.
It is understood that they agreed practically to a man to insist on their demand for a clause in the provincial boundaries extension bill safeguarding the rights of the Roman Catholic minority to separate schools in the districts to be added to Manitoba.
The government bill as now drafted does not provide for that, and an ultimatum was sent to Premier Borden declaring that the government could not count on the support of the Quebec members unless their demand was granted.
They further insisted on a "show down" on the naval question this session. The government has not agreed as yet to allow time for Mr. Seavoy's resolution, which is the order paper, urging the immediate repeal of the naval law, to come up for discussion. The caucus tonight decided to insist that they go back to their constituents without stabilizing themselves unless they could show they had made honest attempts to carry out their election promises in regard to the navy.
It is stated that the discussion became decidedly warm, and at times acrimonious, and the appeals of the Quebec ministers present not to embarrass the government were not very sympathetically received.
Premier Borden and Hon. Robert Rogers were summoned to the caucus and asked for a clear statement as to what their Quebec supporters could expect.
The final result is, of course, kept secret, but the caucus tonight decided to refer the matter to the committee on the navy, and the Premier is decidedly worried over the situation and no compromise which will satisfy all the wings of his party is in sight. It would not be surprising if the coming week finds the Nationalists ready to make a move.
