Revival of Trade. Reports from the United States support the view that trade interests have vastly improved recently and that the business outlook for the future is encouraging. This will be welcome news to the people of Canada, since our own trade interest will be stimulated and improved. News and Notes. A singular death occurred in Ontario the other day when Mr. Geo. Bennett of Eden, near Tilsonburg, was killed while engaged in spitting stamps, by being caught in an opening, which closed on him.

Steamer Bagravia of the Anchor Line, and laden with lumber, was at Black Point Friday morning, west of about 4 o'clock. The vessel was to be towed to the harbor by five miles up the bay of Pandy. Tugs were sent to her assistance but without avail, and it is expected that the vessel will never come off. The cargo is about all saved.

There was an animated scene off Halifax harbor Monday morning. The coast was fairly boiling with mackerel for miles around and the fleet of about sixty vessels floated in the midst of teeming schools. There were hundreds of thousands of dollars worth in the schools which were off the harbor all day. Some vessels made very large hauls. The fish were largely number ones.

The small encouragement given to Hon. Peter Mitchell in Northumberland in the present election campaign must make it apparent to him that he will be beaten by a much larger majority than he was in February last, and it would, therefore, be a sensible and graceful act on his part to retire, as many of his former political friends advise him to do.

Halifax, May 22--Judge Townshend gave a decision this afternoon in the application for a writ of habeas corpus in the case of the prisoner in the Chatham Jail. His lordship filed a lengthy judgment, from which the following is extracted:-- "The newspapers and to Ruggles' affidavit are copies of the Deputy Court, Weymouth Free Press and the Franklin, a French newspaper published at Quebec. These papers all contain comments of the most reprehensible character, for which the publishers will deserve to be punished, and it is hoped it is not yet too late to proceed against them, as a warning in future. Said publications are so clearly calculated to interfere with the proper administration of justice that one can only be surprised that intelligent men would permit their columns to be used in spreading matter possibly injurious to a prisoner about to be tried for his life."

"It is my duty to see if possible that the trial in which the prisoner's life is at stake take place before a jury untaunted with the prejudice of forgone confessions." The judge thought that the case was one in which a change of venue should be granted, and ordered that the prisoner be tried at the term of the supreme court which opens at Kentville on Tuesday, June 2nd.
