McKEOWN AND O'BRIEN.

If a party is to be judged by its leaders, the choice of the convention last night is not complimentary to the liberals of St. John. There were two men before the convention. One was a man of solidity and worth, a good citizen, an earnest and consistent liberal, a candidate who would command the liking and respect alike of his political supporters and his opposers.

Mr. Emmerson has been negotiating with Mr. McKewon since last week and, though he diplomatically refrained from openly expressing his preference, he let it be generally known that those who supported that candidate would win favor with the new minister of the greatest patronage distributing portfolio in Canada. Mr. O'Brien has evinced a capacity for thinking for himself which does not render him popular with leaders who have been raised to power under the machine system.

Several quotations have been published from Mr. Blair's article on "Canadian railways" in the twentieth anniversary number of the Financial News of London, England. The following paragraph quoted in the Montreal Star is an article reprinted elsewhere in this paper will, however, be new to most readers.
