

Works are situate on the Misped River, a quarter of a mile from the sea and six miles by water from the City of Saint John. The wharf accommodation is ample. Works are negative and substantially built of presse brick, fitted with modern and up to date appliances, including electric plant, and are capable of producing two hundred tons of pulp per week. There is room in the present building for additional plant, which when installed would double the output. The mill dam is substantially built of stone and is about fifty feet high. The water is taken to the turbine wheels in an iron flume five feet in diameter which gives ample supply for driving which gives ample supply for driving machinery and pulp making.
