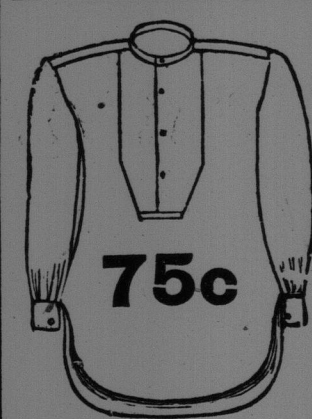

A. Roy Nobles, deceased, was buried this afternoon from his father's home, 28 Wright street. A very large number of citizens, young and old, attended, and Rev. Wellington Camp and A. B. Cohoe conducted the service. Interment was made in the Methodist grounds. Intimate associates from Camp Comfort and Renforth circles carried the coffin.

## O'NEILL LUMBER CO. CHANGES HANDS

Has Been Bought Outright by Bay Shore Co.

New Management Will Improve the Milling Plant and Continue Operations—Price Not Mentioned.

The O'Neill Lumber Company has been bought out by the Bay Shore Lumber Company, P. C. Whitehouse, of Nottingham, and David S. Cowles, of New York, who were at the Royal are here in connection with the deal. These gentlemen when seen by the Star this morning stated that the Bay Shore Company had purchased the two mills of the O'Neill Company.

This year's cut and the entire camping outfit is also included in the sale. Messrs. Whitehouse and Cowles would not state the price paid by their company.

The operations of the O'Neill Company will be resumed by the new concern, and very few changes will be made this winter.

It is expected that extensive improvements will be made during the coming summer. The property is situated on the Irish river, near St. Martin's, and includes many acres of valuable timber lands.

**TWO TENDERS RECEIVED FOR THE NEW WHARF**

D. C. Clark and Clark & Adams are the Bidders—Mr. Mayes Said to be Interested

D. C. Clark and Messrs. Clark & Adams sent in tenders for the construction of the new wharf at Sand Point.

Tenders were advertised for at about three weeks ago and the time for receiving them expired today. The first received was that of Messrs. Clark & Adams, the west side contractors. It was thought that they would be the only tenders, but just a short time before noon D. C. Clark's tender arrived. Neither envelopes containing the tenders were opened today.

They will be read at a meeting of the board of works tomorrow.

It is understood around city hall that G. S. Mayes is interested in the matter with Clark & Adams.

At tomorrow's meeting of the board of works for starting work on the new wharf will be discussed. Director Cushing will present a report stating how much dredging will be required.

The plans for the new wharf have been open for examination for some time past and both firms who tendered have inspected them thoroughly.
